HEALTHY BABIES.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

To mothers in the West End. Good news! We are opening a new Welfare Centre next Friday afternoon at 2.30 at the Presbyterian School, Power St. (corner of Patrick St.) Lady Cross, who is very kindly coming to open it for us, and the heaviest baby that after under 6 months of age is going to have a prize!

Do you know there are 5 sets of twins in the West End? It would be nice if we could see some of these down at the Clinic.

Anyway do bring along the wee babies and let us try to keep them well.

For mothers who are knitting. Here is a nice baby's vest. Required: 1 ounce 2 or 3 ply unshrunkable vest wool. 2 Bone needles No. 8.

To Knit.—Cast on 60 stitches. Knit 60 rows i.e. 30 ridges plain knitting. X Cast on 25 more stitches for the arm. Knit back 50 stitches, and then back-

wards and forwards, decreasing 1 stitch at the beginning of each needle until 40 stitches are left. Continue to knit these for 30 rows for the length of the sleeve. Then knit 15 rows ribbed, 2 plain, 2 puri, and cast off loosely. The sleeve is then complete.

Pick up the backs of the 25 stitches cast on for the arm, beginning at the shoulder, and knit 36 stitches left on the needle. Care must be taken not to twist the work when the 25 stitches are picked up.

There are now 60 stitches again on the needle for the back. Knit 70 rows and repeat from X for the second sleeve. Knit 60 rows for the front and cast off loosely. Sew up sleeves and about 1 1/2 inches for the shoulder. Crochet a little edging around the neck and run in a ribbon.

The Prohibition Issue

The Editor, Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—My attention has been called to some figures given in your paper of yesterday's date, comparing arrests for drunkenness in Ontario and Quebec to the detriment of so called "dry" Ontario. As you are aware figures are not always what they seem. For example to contrast "dry" Ontario with "wet" Quebec is not correct. Territorially the larger part of Quebec is "dry". Practically all Rural Quebec is under Local Option, due largely to the efforts of the parish priests who have steadily resisted all efforts of the Quebec Liquor Commission to repeal the law. The cities and towns are wet. That is one fact which your quoted figures do not tell.

But there is another and more important fact still which your figures do not show, and that is that under the Ontario Temperance Act, the police must arrest anyone showing any signs of intoxication, while in the wet part of Quebec, the police only arrest persons who are violently drunk. Arrests for drunkenness are not very popular with police chiefs in Montreal, for example, and the policeman governs himself accordingly. As a matter of fact the figures quoted, and the extract from the "Montreal Review" quoted in an editorial a few days ago, are part of a propaganda run by the Tacheau Government and its friends the brewers, to hide the ghastly failure of the Quebec Liquor Act—a failure which has brought protests from the press and clergy. The Wine and Beer Licensees have not only not prevented the drinking of the stronger liquors, but have increased the facilities of such drinking. Bootlegging and Moonshine is so prevalent that the Catholic Bishops a few months ago denounced the same and urged their people to keep the law.

A New Wonder of the World

THE ROMANCE OF LIVERPOOL'S GREAT CATHEDRAL.

For twenty years Liverpool has been building a cathedral which will be one of the wonders of the world, and next week the first portion of it will be dedicated in the presence of the King and Queen. When completed it will be the second largest cathedral in existence, ranking next to St. Peter's at Rome.

The edifice will mark an epoch in the history of the Church of England, for it will be the first Anglican Cathedral dedicated in this country for over seven hundred years, and it is a striking tribute to the revival in religious belief that such a wonderful work can be carried out.

But there is something else which captures the fancy concerning Liverpool Cathedral, and this concerns the young man of twenty who designed the gigantic structure, and whose name will go down in history as one of Britain's greatest architects.

Designed in Spare Time.

He is Giles Gilbert Scott, R.A., and when the competition for the Cathedral design was announced, he was employed in an architect's office in Liverpool. His master decided to enter the competition, and so did the pupil—but without informing his employer. Scott carried out his immense drawings necessary during the short hours he was free from office work, and we are told that when his employer found it necessary to rebuke the young man for being late

NEW HAVEN AND BOSTON AND MAINE.

(From Boston News Bureau, August 1st, 1924.)

Master in Codman Suit Finds New Haven Not Attempting to Get Control of Boston and Maine.

Boston.—That the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad is not attempting to get control of Boston and Maine, but is desirous only of having representation on the board of the latter to protect investment of the New Haven in Boston and Maine, is the finding of Ebbidge B. Anderson, appointed by the Supreme Court to hear the facts in suit by Edmund D. Codman alleging the New Haven was acting in violation of section 71 of chapter 160 of the General Laws, prohibiting a railroad from acquiring stock of another.

In the mornings he never for a moment imagined the cause was energy rather than sleepy-headedness!

When the results were declared and Scott's designs were announced as the winning ones, his master was, perhaps, even more surprised than the fortunate young man himself. The choice has been proved, now that a portion of the building is complete, to have been a wise one, and experts are agreed that the structure will be far and away the most important building of our time. The cost of the whole building, it is estimated, will be about two million pounds, which is being raised by public subscription. Next to the structure itself, one of the chief beauties will be the windows, which will be as striking as it will be possible to make them. Some of these will commemorate the deeds of women notable for their good works. One of the most remarkable of the memorials will be that dedicated to the memory of Kitty Wilkinson, who, during the great cholera epidemic of 1832, played a noble part in helping the poor.

It has been arranged, too, that a book containing the names of the 33,000 men from the Liverpool district who gave their lives for their country in the war will be placed in the Cathedral.

Another interesting fact about the Cathedral is that it stands on one of the highest points in the city, and its dome will be to Liverpool what the dome of St. Paul's is to London. It will be a landmark visible out at sea, and will be the first building to arrive the eye of passengers arriving in the Mersey from America.

A comparison of the Cathedral's dimensions as compared with those of other churches gives some idea of its size. It will be the biggest ecclesiastical building in Great Britain. At present this honour falls to York Minster, but Liverpool Cathedral will

"I find," says Mr. Anderson, "that the attitude of the New Haven towards the Boston and Maine is as follows: The New Haven railroad desired proportionate representation on the board of directors of the Boston and Maine in protecting the interests of both companies so that they might be of mutual advantage, but not of disadvantage to either."

"The officers of the respondent railroad believed that as they were the indirect holders of 28.3% of the stock of the Boston and Maine, and as they had an investment indirectly in the Boston and Maine of about \$27,000,000, they had a right to have proportionate representation on the board so that they might follow the activities of Boston and Maine to see to it that the interest was not depleted, and by that means they could watch the financial situation of the Boston and Maine and give attention to the situation, and if possible aid in devising means practicable for the assistance and co-operation both in increasing Boston and Maine revenues and otherwise financing its requirements."

"I find that the respondent did have this large financial interest in Boston and Maine, and that it was the duty of the directors of the New Haven to see to it that the investment was protected, and that they would not have been faithful to their trust had they not attempted to do everything possible to see to it that the Boston and Maine was a paying proposition, provided what they did could lawfully be done. In order to safeguard the interests of the New Haven in the Boston and Maine, the respondent believed that friendly close co-operation between the Boston and Maine and the New Haven would give several millions a year additional revenue to both."
