

Broadly speaking, the United Committee declares that prohibition, because of its non-enforcement, has brought about little improvement as regards crime and drunkenness of the conditions prevailing under the old licensing system. It describes the country as "being debauched with a flood of poisonous liquor smuggled over the border and over the water, or manufactured by brewers under Federal permits, or in countless barns, cellars and garrets."
