The English Agricultural Laborers.

The Agricultural Laborers' Union in England has made a report, from which we may gather the bright side of English peasant life. Of the agricultural laborers of the whole country, numbering some six hundred thousand adult males, one-fourth, or 150,000 are enrolled in the Union. They are scattered over the different counties, and after paying all expenses, and carrying on an active agitation, a balance of £2,500 remains in the treasury. Meanwhile, wages have advanced from one to four shillings a week over the country. Forty dollars is now paid for the harvest month, where twenty-five used to be, and it is hoped that a proportionate rise of wages next summer will be the general rule.

But there is also, unhappily, a dark side to the picture, which is now brought out prominently in the papers, as they look forward to the approach of winter.

Nothing, or next to nothing has been won without a strike, the farmers fighting to the last, and the landlords standing by them. The men are very anxious to have a plot of ground assigned to them with their houses, to be cultivated for themselves; but this reasonable demand, the Duke of Marlborough, one of the greatest proprietors in the country, has met by a haughty and defiant letter, in which he lays it down that a laborer's cottage on his estate shall hereafter be vacated whenever the laborer is dismissed by his exaployer, and the Bishcp of Ripon has been foolish enough to denounce the Union masses foolish enough to denounce the Union masses foolish enough to denounce the Union and agitators under the town pump. Remedy for the Cattle Disease—According to a statement in the London Times, a remedy for cattle disease has just been put imb practice by a Mr. Stratton, of Aylestone, Dorchester, with marvellous effect, no fewer than 15 fine Alderneys fixing been saved by it. The process' adopted was as follows:—One ounce of chlorate of potash dissolved in one quart of wafer, adding eight frachms of camphorated spirits of wine when about to administer the dose. When the feet become lame, some tar, softened with a little lard, placed upon the parts presenting any soreness or discharge will case and heal. This is to be repeated for three days, and half the quantity for sheep or calves for the same period. The discoverer says—"I have administered it with my own hand to my own animals.
