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WESTERN CANADIANS PRIDE OF THE WORLD A Prominent Writer Believes Our People Are the Best FOR NEXT 50 YEARS BEST PHYSICAL AVERAGE The Finest Specimen of Manhood the World Can Produce.

Western Canada will be the home of the finest race of men and women in the world for perhaps the next fifty years in the opinion of Emerson Hough, the well known writer, expressed in an article, entitled, "The Man Question — the Genus Homo in Foreign Parts" in the 15th issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

He draws fine distinctions between the physical characteristics of the English, German, Austrian, French and Italian soldiers, alleging that the Austrian officers are resorting to corsets to give them a more manly appearance. He goes on to show that the men of the greatest physical and mental strength drift to the newer countries, and it is for that reason that he says the largest men today are found on the Pacific coast, Alaska and in Western Canada, and calling attention to the fact that Canada is destined to become the scene of the greatest industrial activity for the next fifty years, he says it is likewise bound to be inhabited by the largest and most daring body of men in the world.

SYNOD DISCUSSES SITE OF A COLLEGE PRESBYTERIANS ARE INFORMED OF RAPID PROGRESS OF CALGARY UNIVERSITY THE DECISION MAY BE POSTPONED FOR A YEAR Dr. TORY REFERS TO THE ENEMIES OF THE ALBERTA UNIVERSITY

Edmonton, April 26.—The location of the Theological College of the Presbyterians in this province was the live topic of discussion at the meeting of the Presbyterian synod this afternoon and evening.

In the afternoon the delegates to the synod were the guests of the university, and above the site of the institution by the president. The foundations of the new building were examined.

There was a banquet at the Knox church, at which Dr. Tory made an address on the subject "The University and the Church." He deplored the connection was not closer. He thought that the Bible should be taught in the university as a text book, but that was not feasible. He strongly appreciated the sectional feeling in connection with the university, and concluded by saying that the enemies of the university were the enemies of the province.

In the evening a motion was brought in that the synod should recommend to the assembly that a Theological College should be established in Alberta, affiliated with the provincial university. Mr. Miller of Saskatchewan introduced the motion, which was seconded by Rev. Dr. McQueen of Knox church, Edmonton. Both made strong speeches.

The motion was opposed by Rev. Mr. McWilliams of Grace Presbyterian church, Calgary. He favored delay for a year. He referred to the fact that a university was being established in Calgary, and told how well advanced such an institution was. It might be found by next year that Calgary would be very much the better place for such an institution. He should move slowly.

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
