About six-thirty o'clock on Thursday morning, of last week, fire was discovered in the wall and roof of the house of Miss McCausland on Sydenham street, which gained considerable headway before the firemen were able to put it out. They got out in good time and were on the job in a very short time, but the fire was a particularly hard one to fight, as the house is built of brick and the fire was confined to the walls, floors and under the roof. It is believed the fire originated from an over-heated stove pipe from a gas heater. The pipe ran up through a bedroom, and through the ceiling through a metal thimble. Instead of burning around the thimble the blaze ran along the ceiling and over into the wall and to the roof. It was burning in many places before the alarm was given. The house and contents were partially covered by insurance.

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
