FAIR AND COOL.

Toronto, Nov. 4.—11 p.m.—An anti-
cyclone of some importance now covers the
western portion of the continent, and the
pressure is a little below its average from
the lakes to the Atlantic. Fresh gales
prevailed very generally yesterday, but
today the weather in Canada has been, on
the whole, fair.

Jabez Must Go Back.

BENOS AYRES, Nov. 4.—The Govern-
ment has granted the extradition of Jabez
Spencer Balfour, the absconding head of
the Liberator Association and ex-member
of Parliament, and he will be taken to
England without delay.

Mr. Mercier's Will.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—The will of the late
ex-Premier Mercier bequeathes practically
nothing, as the insurance on his life was
already made out in favor of Mme. Mercier
and her three children. It is said to reach
\$24,000. This, together with some lots in
the township of Labelle, which are already
in the name of his wife, and the furniture
in the house, is all that he leaves to his
family.

Killed With a Pocket Eraser.

BROOKLYN, Nov. 4.—As the result of
carelessness in handling a small pocket
eraser at the Fourteenth Regiment Armory
yesterday, a young man met his death at the hands of
another. The victim was Robert Dillman,
26 years old, and the brother is Frederick
Dillman, 21 years. Robert had asked to
see the eraser, whereupon his brother made
a playful lunge at him with the blade.
Robert, losing his balance, fell forward,
receiving the eraser point in his heart.
Frederick was arrested. The judge, while
expressing sympathy for the prisoner, re-
gretted that under the circumstances he
could not accept bail and remanded him to
jail. The mother of the men is so pro-
strated with grief that her doctor fears she
will not survive the shock.
