> PARNELL REMEMBERED. London, Oct. 7.- The anniversary of the death of Charles Stewart Parnell, the Irish leader, was observed at Dublin yesterday in the customary manner. The Lord Mayor, most of the municipal authorities and Messrs. John and William Redmond, Harrington, Field, O'Kelly, John H. Parnell (brother of Charles Stewart Parnell), Hayden, Clancy, P. O'Brien, and Kenney, all members of the House of Commons, delegates from the National League, a large number of political bodies and others marched in procession to Glasnevin Cemetery were Mr. Parnell is buried, and placed wreaths upon his grave. The procession was two miles long.

PORTUGAL PERTURBED. Madrid, Oct. 7.-The general opinion in well-informed quarters is that the critical political situation in Portugal is the real cause of the impending visit of the king of that country to London, Madrid, Rome and Berlin. The growing power of the Liberals and heir discontent against the Government threaten to bring about a revolution. It is stated that the Liberal leaders have informed the King that unless he dismisses the Cabinet he cannot prevent their followers from rising. The king fears the Liberals, but for the present he adheres to his Ministers. He desires to sound the courts of Great Britain, Spain, Italy, and Germany as to whether they are inclined to support his throne in the event of a Republican revolution.

THE SITUATION AT CONSTANTI-NOPLE.

Constantinople, Oct. 7.-Sir Philip Currie, the British ambassador, has visited Kiamil Pasha, and urged upon him the necessity of assuring the Armenians by stopping the arrests of persons suspected of complicity in the recent rioting. It is expected that Kiamil Pasha will advise the Sultan to grant amnesty to all the Armen-

ians arrersted since Sept. 30. Six foreign diplomats met on Friday and resolved upon sending a collective note to the Porte. They ordered their respective guardships to take their winter moorings in the harbon in order to be in readiness to protect foreigners. Ambassador Currie has asked the Porte for permission to instruct Secretary Sister to visit the

Telescoped. Brussels, Oct. 7 .- Dispatches received here this morning from Havre, 15 miles from this city, where the collision between a crowded passenger train and an engine occurred yesterday evening, show that 18 instead of 10 persons were killed and that 100 persons and not 40 were injured. Several of the wounded people are so seriously injured that their lives are despaired of. There are no Americans among the dead or injured. The passenger train was just passing the railroad station at Mousty when an engine, coming from Ottigies at full speed, collided with it and telescoped three of the carriages. Relief gangs and medical assistance was promptly sent to the scene of the accident from all neighboring points and everything possible was done to succer the wounded, at least 30 of whom

#### nected with church organizations. SUNK IN ST. CLAIR FLATS. Two Schooners at the Bottem-Propeller

Runs Them Down. Detroit, Mich., Oct. 7 .- As the result of a collision which occurred in the notheast bend at the St. Clair Flats the shooner Itasca lies at the bottom of the St. Clair River, and the schooner St. Mary lies on her theam ends, sunk in shallow water. The schooners were bound up, in tow of the Canadian tug Kittle Haight, when they were run down by the propeller Park Foster, beund down. The collision resulted from a misunderstanding of signals. The propeller crashed into the Itasca on her starboard quarter, staving her in so that she sank immediately.

SIR OLIVER MOWAT'S RETURN.

WHOLE NO. 12317.

Interviewed at Montreal, He Ridicules the Rumor of His Intention of Resign-

ing-British Politics. Montreal, Oct. 6 .- (Special.) - Sir Oliver Mowat arrived in the city this afternoon on the steamship Vancouver, accompanied by Miss Mowat, Miss Greer and O. M. Biggar. The party drove at once to the Windsor, where they will stay until the morning, and then leave for Toronto by the day train. In speaking to The Globe correspondent Sir Oliver ridiculed the rumor that he was going to resign.

"No, I have not the least intention of resigning," said Sir Oliver, "and such a step could not be on account of my health in any case." The hon, gentleman's appearance bore out the remark. He looks ten years younger than when he went away. His cheeks are ruddy, and there is the same genial twinkle in his eye. The host of friends who called during the evening were delighted with his manifest good health. "I did not go away for my health," continued Six Oliver. "I went chiefly to watch the argument in the prohibition appeal before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. When that was over I travelled in England and Scotland, and also in Holland, Switzerland and France, but not to any great extent." "What do you think of the proposal to give the colonies representation on the Judicial Committee

"I cannot say very much about it. I think the present system is a good one. The Judges, of course, are not famil-iar with the class of cases which come from the colonies and with the feelings and thoughts of the people, but they apply themselves with the greatdiligence to the immediate case before them, study the points thoroughly and take sactive part in the arguments and conversation of the counsel. Then they are always the same as Judges. If the colonies sent Judges their representation would be changing from time to

time, and what does an Australian know. of our institutions or we of theirs ?" Regarding British politics Sir Oliver regretted that he was unable to see much of what was going on owing to his attendance at the hearing of the appeals. "I was much disappointed that I was unable to see Mr. Gladstone," he said, "and I did not see as many of the prominent men as I expected. When I had time to look around the crisis had come and things were in a turmon, and after the fight most of the prominent politicians left London. The defeat of the Liberal party was due to many causes, but the greatest was the power exercised by the liquor interest. We have no conception of it here. DR. FLANNERY'S ANNIVERSARY. The Popular St. Thomas Priest Honored by His Flock-A Successful

Career. St. Thomas, Oct. 7 .- Rev. Wm. Flannery, D.D., having completed his 25th year of his pastorate of the Church of the Holy Angels yesterday, celebrated his silver jubilee. After high mass in the morning he was presented with an address and a money testimonial on behalf of the congregation, and after vespers in the evening with addresses and bouquets by the ladies and children. When the doctor came here in October. 1870, St. Thomas was only a village of 1,800, and the Roman Catholic congregation worshiped in a tumble-down frame building. Two years afterwards the present commodious brick church was completed and dedicated, and in 1879 a new separate school building was erected. A new cemetery has also been purchased during the doctor's pastorate. All of these have bene paid for, and there is now a flourishing congregation of about 1,000 souls, part of whom are in the surrounding townships. His degree of doctor of divinity was received in 1892 from St. George's University, Washington. The doctor is popular among citizens generally, as well as his own congregation.
