Calls Them Cowards

Madagascar's Brave Queen Rebukes Her Soldiers.

Critical Condition of Affairs in Constantinople.

Dead Bodies of Armenians Thrown Into the Sea—Latest Cable News.

HE'S SICK.

London, Oct. 7.—A Shanghai dispatch says: The Viceroy of Nanking has declined to receive Vice-Admiral Bullock, pleading illness. The British ships have left Nanking.

OLD LANDMARK BURNED.
London, Oct. 7.—Hensell's old store at Newcastle, occupying a 200-year mansion belonging to the corporation, and the timber yards were destroyed by fire today. The exact loss is not known, but it will amount to many thousands of pounds.

"COWARDS."

Paris, Oct. 7.—Advices from Antananarivo, the capital of Madagascar, under date of Sept. 22, are to the effect that Queen Ramavalona has issued a proclamation accusing her army of cowardice. Her Majesty declares that she will neither leave the capital nor yield to the French. Foreigners are unable to leave the city.

THE QUEEN'S HEALTH.
London, Oct. 7.—A doubtful rumor has found currency that the Queen will make a visit to Ireland next summer. Though her Majesty is enjoying fine health and is vigorous for her years, she has an increasing dislike for crowds or noise of any kind. During her railway journeys all the stations at which she desires to stop are cleared of people as far as possible.

TROUBLE IN CRETE.
London, Oct. 7.—The situation of affairs in the Island of Crete is very unsettled. Many murders have recently been committed, and robbery and other acts of lawlessness are reported of frequent occurrence. As a result, the Governor of Crete has offered to resign his position, and the matter is now understood to be under consideration. The Cretans have been deeply impressed with the Armenian troubles at Constantinople, and the inhabitants of the island have presented a long memorandum to the representatives of the powers against the Turkish administration of Crete.

PARNELL REMEMBERED.
London, Oct. 7.—The anniversary of the death of Charles Stewart Parnell, the Irish leader, was observed at Dublin yesterday in the customary manner. The Lord Mayor, most of the municipal authorities and Messrs. John and William Redmond, Harrington, Field, O'Kelly, John H. Parnell (brother of Charles Stewart Parnell), Hayden, Clancy, P. O'Brien, and Kenall, all members of the House of Commons, delegates from the National League, a large number of political bodies and others marched in procession to Glasnevin Cemetery where Mr. Parnell is buried, and placed wreaths upon his grave. The procession was two miles long.

PORTUGAL PERTURBED.
Madrid, Oct. 7.—The general opinion in well-informed quarters is that the critical political situation in Portugal is the real cause of the impending visit of the king of that country to London, Madrid, Rome and Berlin. The growing power of the Liberals and their ambition to overthrow the Government threaten to bring about a revolution. It is stated that the Liberal leaders have informed the king that unless he dismisses the Cabinet he cannot resign his position, and has risked the king fears the Liberals, but for the present he adheres to his Ministers. He desires to sound the courts of Great Britain, Spain, Italy, and Germany as to whether they are inclined to support his throne in the event of a Republican revolution.

THE SITUATION AT CONSTANTINOPLE.
Constantinople, Oct. 7.—Sir Philip Currie, the British ambassador, has visited Kiamli Pasha, and urged upon him the necessity of assuring the Armenians by stopping the arrests of persons suspected of complicity in the recent rioting. It is expected that Kiamli Pasha will advise the Sultan to grant amnesty to all the Armenians arrested since Sept. 30.

Six foreign diplomats met on Friday and resolved upon sending a collective note to the Porte, requesting their respective governments to take their winter moorings in the harbor in order to be in readiness to protect foreigners. Ambassador Currie has also the Porte for permission to instruct Secretary Sizer to visit the

prisons where the Armenians are in custody.

Eighty persons were registered as having been killed on Monday and Tuesday last. None of the bodies of those killed in the Kasim quarter have been recovered. It is known that the bodies of many of those who lost their lives during the riots were thrown into the sea. So far as known only Major Seret Bey and two subalterns were killed on the Turkish side during the rioting on Sept. 30. A few casualties were wounded. The Musselman laborers in the Pera gas works killed 21 of their Armenian comrades on the night of Oct. 3. The refugees in the churches remained there, and the number is increasing. A hundred women and children took refuge today in the garden of the British embassy, which goes to prove that although quiet prevails in the city, the Armenians are apprehensive that further attacks will be made upon them.

A dispatch from Constantinople says that while the city is quiet, the streets are still patrolled by soldiers, and many arrests are being made. The Sultan, when he appeared in public, had an unusual number of body guards. All the Armenians hitherto employed about the Yildiz Palace have been dismissed.

THE BELGIAN RAILWAY HORROR.
The Killed Number Eighteen—Three Cars Telescoped.

Brussels, Oct. 7.—Dispatches received here this morning from Havre, 15 miles from this city, where the collision between a crowded passenger train and an engine occurred yesterday evening, show that 18 instead of 10 persons were killed and that 100 persons and not 40 were injured. Several of the wounded people are so seriously injured that their lives are despaired of. There are no Americans among the dead or injured. The passenger train was just passing the railroad station at Mousty when an engine, coming from Ottignies at full speed, collided with it and telescoped three of the carriages. Relief gangs and medical assistance were promptly sent to the scene of the accident from all neighboring points and everything possible was done to succor the wounded, at least 30 of whom were in need of prompt assistance.

Among those who were aboard the train were M. Bernaert, President of the Chamber of Deputies, and his family. None of them sustained serious injuries and the wife was unhurt. Mme. Mourlon, wife of the well-known engineer, was among the killed.

Sparks from the Wire.
Sir Donald Smith broke his arm in Britain recently.

Owen Murphy, ex-mayor of Quebec and well-known politician, is dead.

Cuban insurgents have declared Cuba an independent Cuban republic, and then elected a President and Cabinet.

Dr. Dawson, director of the Geological Survey, computes that there are 1,200 miles of unexplored territory in Canada.

The large two-story brick sash and door factory of Rufus R. Thomas & Co., Philadelphia, was burned Friday. Loss \$100,000.
