He Defeats Mr. Jones by a Majority of 82.

The Vote the Largest Ever Cast in a Municipal Contest.

Messrs. Cowan and Judd Elected Water Commissioners.

Eight New Men Will Serve on the Council Board.

A Lively Mass Meeting in the City

Mr. Jones Attacks the Women and Announces His Future Plans.

Full Returns of the Vote for Aldermer and School Trustees-The People Wan the Assessment Rolls Published-Deeply Interested Crowds Watch the "Advertister" Bulletin.

Mr. J. W. Little was elected mayor o London yesterday by a majority of 82 in the heaviest vote that has ever been polled in a municipal contest in the Forest City Eight new faces will be seen around the council board of 1895, and several old standbys tell by the wayside, caught as i were in the mud which accompanied yesterday's January thaw. The vote polle in the mayoralty contest was 5,882, com-pared with 4,788 last year.

THE WATER COMMISSIONERS. Mr. R. K. Cowan, with 3,604 votes, headed the poll in the water commission vote. Ald. Judd came second with 3,205 yotes, and Ald. Coo received 2,066. SCHOOL TRUSTEES.
