Toronto, Feb. 18.—The estimates for the Provincial service for the year ending Dec. 31, 1897, were laid on the table yesterday, and have been placed considerably under last year's vote. The appropriation bill of 1896 provided \$3,538,861 17, while the present estimate calls for \$3,516,068 55, including \$50,000 inserted for unforeseen expenses. Under the head of civil government there is a decrease of \$1,035; legislation, \$2,-300; agriculture, \$4,831; hospitals and charities, \$8,892 70; maintenance and recharities, \$8,892 70; maintenance and repairs, \$1,949; public buildings, \$98.476; \$public works, \$11,973; colonization roads, \$19,500; miscellaneous, \$4,537 55. If the other hand the increases are: (administration of justice, \$1,521 60; leducation, \$13,791 06; public institutions maintenance, \$6,836; charges on Crown lands, \$53,336; refund account, \$9,077 97; statute consolidation, partially a revote, \$10,000.
