Man Confesses to Being a Teacher of Insanity

He Successfully Shammed Lunacy and Taught It to Other Prisoners.

New York, April 2. - Charles Shapiro, under indictment for murder in the first degree, made the remarkable when arraigned before Judge Cowing, that he has been shamming insanity for five years and has deceived local physicians as well as the physicians of the Matteawan Insane Asylum. Shapiro is credited with being the founder of the School of Insanity in the Tombs. He started the work when he was locked up five years ago. He was in love with Yetta Gordon, who lived at Clinton and Grand streets, and Louis Lieberman supplanted him in the girl's regard. Shapiro had a quarrel with Lieerman, stabbed him and inflicted fatal Italian Statesman Thinks They Are injuries. WITH A MADMAN

Stabs His Guardian to Death on a Train,

Takes Custodian's Revolver From Him and Shoots Into Crowd-Surrenders Quietly to Officers.

Jacksonville, Ill., April 2.-T. B. Campbell, a deputy sheriff of McDonough County, was stabbed and killed by James B. Wilson, an insane man, on a Burlington train at Chapin, Campbell was in custody of Wilson, who was bringing him to the Central Insane Hospital.

It was necessary to change cars at Chapin, and as the train pulled into the station and the porter called out "Change for Jacksonville," Wilson cried out "-Jacksonville," and at the same moment sprang on his guardian with an open knife. The officer was wholly unprepared for the attack, and was unable to defend himself. Wilson's first thrust with the weapon cut out the sheriff's left eye, and the two then grappled. Wilson, with his madman's strength, continued to stab Campbell in the side and back, and then

The deputy, in an effort to save himself, drew a revolver, but it was wrested from him by the madman, who then' tried to use the weapon on the other passengers, who by this time had fled to the depot platform, all of them being women and children

At this moment the stricken deputy and his mad charge were the only occupants for a moment. The conductor then went to the rear of the car, while the town marshal approached by the other door. As he neared Wilson he displayed his star, and the madman, seeing this, exclaimed: "Are you the officer? Then take this knife and gun, and lead me to a place where I can wash my hands." He then permitted himself to be taken to the town jail. The revolver had a safety lock, which prevented its use.

Stabbed and mutilated as Campbell was, he roused himself after this encounter and staggered from the car to the plat-

form, where he fell forward dead. Where Wilson secured the knife is a mystery, but it is supposed that it was given to him by one of the passengers, Paris. April 2.-The French Foreign who did not know that he was insane. he was not insane, and this belief was strengthened when there were no commitment papers found on the person of the deputy sheriff. On this theory Wilson was placed in jail here instead of being taken to the insane hospital.

> It was made clear, however, that Wilson was insane, as the commitment papers were found in the satchel of the deputy sheriff, which was carried on into St. Louis instead of being thrown off
