Chicago, July 19.—This was another "Following out this plan the gov- day for squeezing shorts in the oats ernment has dredges at work at Mid- pit. New July standard oats were excitedly bid up 7% to 65c, the highest price since 1874. Aside from the large short line that is held by one of the leading professionals the principal cause of the erratic gyrations displayed by oat prices today was that of ruined harvests by reason of the recent heavy rains. Others grains were bullishly affected by the rains, but liquidation caused reaction. At the close July oats showed a gain of 71/2c. September oats ½c, and July 1¾c. September corn lost ¼c to ¾c; July wheat ½c and September wheat ½c. Provisions closed 7½c to 15c lower. It was a wild day in oats. The cause largely seems to be that there is a natural corner in July new options. Mayor James Patten, of Evanston, who cornered May oats, is credited with a line of nearly 2,000,000 bushels of new July and inasmuch as receipts are very small and contract grading much

smaller, shorts are fearing still worse to hand repeatedly. The cash demand, however, kept up so well that in spite of predicted bumper crops prices continued to advance on the sample tables With heavy rains in the adjacent fields and reports of fallen and twisted yellow grain, shorts became panicky.
