BOARD OF EDUCATION HAS INTERESTING SESSION

Chairman Chas. McCormick Still
Against Domestic Science.

No Pay for Teacher Nor Instruction for
Public School Pupils.

IT is to be that the city council is
to have as a rival in the perfor-
mance of unexpected actions, the
board of education, usually so
staid, so businesslike and reclusive?

The question was uppermost in more
than one mind when the board had
finished its regular monthly business
last night. It had got away from its
customary placidness and its meeting
had actually witnessed two or three
moves which were not in accordance
with the severely sedate and proper
methods that are most often followed
by the trustees. While the meeting
was a short one and the business was
not what might ordinarily be con-
sidered important, it was the least
little bit exciting.

A rule which the board has laid
down is that collections in the
schools shall not be taken. Their ob-
servance of this rule last night means
that the pupils of the city will be de-
prived of the pleasure of contributing,
as the school children of London, to a
national fund for the erection of a
monument to Lord Bessborough, the
most famous of Canadian heroes.

Miss Dunn, of St. Catharines, secretary
of the fund, wrote to the board asking
that the pupils be allowed to contrib-
ute to it. He set his foot down and
said that there can be no romance in their
souls when they can thus ungalantly
allow whatever of patriotic pride may
have taken hold in their brains, and
mention of Laura Secord's name to be
swamped and repressed by a prosaic
desire to abide by mere rules.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE SITUATION
Teacher Not Paid and Public School Pupils
Debarred.

However, that had nothing to do
with the present necessity for leaving
this attractive historical episode and
returning to the further results of the
board's deliberations. They were
chiefly the result of the determination
to have domestic science taught here.

Two interesting situations have arisen
out of it. The first is practically a
deadlock, in which Chairman Mc-
Cormick, is opposed to a majority of
the board upon the subject of paying
the salary of teachers of domestic
science at the Collegiate Institute. The
chairman refuses to sign the pay-
sheet for this department, even though
the teacher has been engaged by the
board, his reason being, he says, that
there is no appropriation for this pur-
pose. The board did not think that any
teacher would have any particular
pleasure in teaching for nothing, more
tangible than the satisfaction of doing
good work, and ordered the chairman
by vote to sign the pay-sheet. He has
since said that he has no intention of
signing it. He set his foot down and
