PNEUMONIA'S HARVEST

Disease Is Epidemie in New York-Cold Increases Deaths. New York, Feb. 18. - The World toay says: The intense cold has been ollowed by a steady increase in the number of deaths from pneumonia in New York. Influenza is prevalent: The records of the health department show a steady increase for the month in deaths from pneumonia, and the returns up to yesterday show that the present week may be a record-breaker. There were 351 deaths last week from pneumonia as compared with 317 deaths for the preceding seven days. Dr. Guilfoy, registrar of the health department, says this shows there are approximately 1,700 cases of pneunonia in the city weekly, and umber is increasing. The city hospitals are taxed to their utmost. There were 1,395 deaths in this city from
