## MYSTERY TO BE CLEARED AWAY

The "Andrew Carnegie" Signature To Be Investigated by the U. S. Authorities.

New York, Dec. 8. - With the arraignment of Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick before a United States commissioner today on a technical charge of aiding and abetting a bank official in misapplying the funds of a national bank, the second stage in this remarkable case was begun. It seems almost certain that these proceedings ultimately will result in clearing away the mystery in which the case has been shrouded.
