WASH BOILER
BABY'S INCUBATOR

By Cleverly Contriving This Artificial Mother, Babe's Life Was Saved.

New York, Oct. 5. — Wrapped in cotton and lying on a down pillow in the bottom of a copper wash boiler, Memorial Johnson, aged 24 hours, weight 39 ounces, is making a brave fight for life at Memorial Hospital, Morristown, N. J., and will probably win. The infant came into the world three months before she was expected, and at its birth the mother died, although this was her eleventh child.

When the baby was born Dr. George L. Johnson and Francis G. Glazebrook thought the infant, who rushed to it, gave a gasp and the doctors went to work to save its life.

"We must improvise something for an incubator," said Dr. Glazebrook. "Give us anything of which we can make an incubator," he continued, addressing the midwife, who rushed to the basement and returned with a copper wash boiler. In the bottom of this a down pillow was placed, and on that the baby, wrapped in cotton, was placed.

Around the outside of the boiler hot water bottles were hung and then a large pane of plate glass was placed over the top of the boiler, so that the interior could be seen. A gas stove was lighted and placed beside the boiler, thus regulating the temperature.

As the baby was born in Memorial Hospital, it was decided to give her the name of "Memorial" Johnson. She weighed, it is thought, about thirty ounces at birth, but has gained rapidly since being placed in the incubator, and is now the wonder of physicians, nurses, patients and visitors.

KAISER'S DOUBLE
HELD A PRISONER

Dignified German Held For Swindling Through Worthless Real Estate Mortgage.

New York, Oct. 5. — Frederick H. Rohrer, a German with much dignity and with a striking resemblance to Emperor William, was committed to Raymond street, yesterday, by Magistrate Tighe in the Butler street court, Brooklyn, in default of \$2,000 bail, on a charge of swindling.

YATCHSMAN MURDERED

Arthur Nichols the Victim of Long Island Sound Pirates.

New York, Oct. 5. — The body of Arthur Nichols, a young man of Mamaroneck, was found on the pier at Mamaroneck, at the foot of Mamaroneck avenue. At the time it was supposed that he was drowned accidentally. A rowboat was found beside the body, and the painter by which it was tied was wound around his leg. The coroner and physicians who examined the body were of the opinion that the young man had gotten into the boat had caught his foot in the rope and tripped overboard.

The matter was dropped until it was heard yesterday that persons had been found that heard cries on the night Nichols is supposed to have been drowned. This has led the police to suspect Nichols met his death at the hands of some of the pirates that have been robbing yachts along the sound between Greenwich and New Rochelle, and they are making an investigation. The thieves have been operating along the sound for nearly a month. They looted the flagstaff of the New Rochelle Yacht Club, owned by Commodore Donovan, and also half a dozen yachts of the Morrisania Yacht Club. There were several yachts moored near the place where the body of Nichols was found, and friends of the young man believe he was surprised by the pirates while they were stripping them, and that they killed him and threw him overboard.

Nichols was a fine swimmer and his friends say it is improbable that he was drowned so near the pier. Nichols was last seen at 10:30 at night. His father keeps a bathhouse and he went to the pier to arrange to take a party out the next day. The neighbors say they heard the cries about 10:30 or 11 o'clock, but paid no attention to them at the time as they thought they came from boys that were playing near the pier.

WAS VICTIM
OF X-RAY CANCER

Details of Clarence M. Dally's Death—Was of Edison's Assistants.

New York, Oct. 4. — A martyr to science, and a pitiable object, lesson of the dangers of the mysterious X-rays, Clarence M. Dally, after seven years of suffering, died yesterday at his home in East Orange.

Dally, seven years ago was the right hand man of Thomas A. Edison, the wizard of Llewellyn Park, West Orange, and it was while chief assistant in the experimenting department of the famous inventor's laboratory that the terrible rays began to exert their malign influence.

When informed of Dally's death last night Mr. Edison said: "Yes, Mr. Dally undoubtedly died from the effects of his experimenting with the X-rays. The rays themselves did the burning and amputating of the entire arm and hand. It was a terrible tragedy."

HAD TO AMPUTATE HAND. The hair and mustache of Dally dried up and fell out. Science could not stop the disintegration of the left hand he had placed so often before the light, and amputation of the entire arm and hand was necessary. Four fingers of the right hand were first cut away and life for a time was prolonged.

FASCINATED BY THE STUDY. At that time Edison was attempting to manufacture good specimens of glass tubes for the X-ray machines. Dally, believing that high power tubes could be secured, worked while others slept trying to solve the problem for himself. Constant manipulation of the tubes, testing them and the power of the rays by allowing the light to pass through his hand finally resulted in bringing a flushed condition of the skin at the back of his left hand. Previously, Dally had begun to fall out from scientific exhibitions at Crystal Palace, in which he placed his hand in the powerful light.

Dr. F. H. Lane of No. 31 Halstead street, East Orange, who was first applied for relief, sent him to Dr. William B. Graves, one of the leading surgeons of New Jersey. Dr. Graves found the case a serious one. The skin of the face began to wrinkle; dermatitis appeared on the neck, and a sore on the back of the left hand. There was no sensation of pain, only a soreness and a numbness.

He was treated carefully, but the hand grew worse and a large, fleshy, hardening of the arteries set in and extended to the most minute blood vessels. The hand was so painful that it was taken away from the work, and the patient was taken to a hospital.

RUSSIAN VIEW
OF THE SITUATION

What the Military Critics at St. Petersburg Would Like to Know.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 5, 12:35 p.m. — The military critics at St. Petersburg share in the general uncertainty as to how to size up the situation. At the front, if Field Marshal Oyama makes his anticipated advance. They seem to agree that a strong screening movement is in progress immediately east of Liao Yang, that probably a feint will be made from the west, that the tactics of the Japanese at Liao Yang will be repeated and that General Kuropatkin will try a wide flanking movement from the east. Some of the critics point out that the conditions at the front are such that the Japanese are in a position to make a change of Oyama's plan of campaign. The continued failure of the attacks on the fortress and the enormous losses sustained by the besiegers, they think, may compel Oyama to dispatch some veteran troops from the Manchurian army to Gen. Nodzu's support, as the reinforcements arriving at Port Arthur are mostly reserve men. Unsubstantiated praise is bestowed on Lieut. General Stoessel for the heroic defense made by the garrison, which naturally is increasing the hope that the fortress may hold out.

In the meantime General Kuropatkin is receiving reinforcements, especially artillery. Nevertheless all the experts express great doubt whether Kuropatkin contemplates more than a passive resistance at Mukden, where, they say, the topographical conditions are unfavorable for defense. It is considered significant that the critics generally agree that the Pass is a better position, both for defense and offense, being protected by the Liao River on the west, and offering strong positions on the Kuma range on the east. The general conclusion is that the Japanese forces will show their hands in a very short time. Evidence is accumulating that Japanese officers are at the head of the bands of Chinese bandits operating in Kuropatkin's right flank, and the continued reports of agitation among the Chinese, spread by the anti-foreign propaganda, are increasing the feeling of anxiety. These factors will soon have to be seriously reckoned with by Russia.

IT WILL BE MY
LAST, HE SAID

Dead Boy Pugilist's Mother Begged of Him Not to Fight.

New York, Oct. 5. — "Good-bye, mother. Don't worry. When I return to-night I will be \$200 richer. After the battle I will give up fighting and stay with you as long as I live." That was the farewell of Pugilist John Peters to his mother before fighting Patrick Darmody on Saturday night.

It was Peters' first and last fight. In the second round he received a blow over the heart that killed him. A relative of the dead man made the following statement last night: "I was at the fight. There was a lot of haggling before the fight started between the managers and the police, who wanted \$20 apiece to allow the fight to go on. I don't know if they received the money, but a few moments later the fight began."

"John Peters had been training faithfully for the 'go' for weeks. His mother objected to him fighting, as he had a bright future before him, as he was studying dentistry and was going into partnership with his brother, who has his office on Washington street, Hoboken. Before he went to North Bergen to fight he met his mother, who was with him when he was killed. With streaming eyes he begged him not to fight. He took her in his arms, kissed her and said: 'Don't fear, mother, this will be my last fight. I will return to you before morning with \$200 in my pocket, and it will be for your birthday present.'"

"At the fight I was standing near John. In the first round he was over the ring, and cleverly blocked the swings made by his opponent. Like a flash Peters saw that he was in a bad way, and he landed three terrific punches on the pit of Darmody's stomach. The fight ended with Darmody who had shape. Peters hadn't a mark on his face or body."

"In the second round there was a little sparring. Darmody hit John a punch over the heart and he fell. He was unable to get up. He was carried from the nose, ears and mouth. A physician was called, but before he arrived John was dead."

"I had to break the sad news to his mother. When I told her that John was dead she became hysterical. He had only listened to the sobbed again and again."

COMPELLED SICK
MEN TO CHARGE

Japanese Officers Threaten to Shoot Down Those Who Lagged.

Choe Foo, Oct. 5. — A dispatch from Nagasaki telling of the ravages of being a Japanese soldier, says that on several occasions the troops protested against orders to charge, because the disease prevented them from advancing, with the necessary result that they were shot.

The officers invariably threatened to shoot the men unless they obeyed, whereupon the sufferers plodded forward or in some cases ran. The Russian casualties, sick and missing, are estimated to have numbered 45,000. One hundred and sixty Russian guns have been captured, and the Japanese have been killed or wounded. These losses occurred exclusively at Port Arthur.

The Peace Congress.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 5. — When the deliberations of the international peace congress were resumed today the program called for the reading and consideration of reports of various committees. It had been arranged also to introduce for the consideration of the international agreement for the reduction of armaments, and also a report of the International Peace Bureau on the reconciliation of France and Germany. Before the meeting was called to order the president, Dr. Doyen, said that the latter subject would be referred to a committee to study and report upon at next year's session, this being the request of both the German and French peace societies.

LOST IN ADIRONDACKS

Two Men, One an Experienced Guide, Missing Since Tuesday.

Utica, Oct. 5. — Anthony Coleman, jun., and Charles W. Jones, both of Forestport, are missing in the Adirondack forest, where they went last Tuesday in quest of deer. They were last seen at the camp of Coughlin & Scanlin, about five miles from White Lake. They took with them only a small amount of provisions and intended to return to Forestport Wednesday night. To reach the forest where they intended hunting necessitated the crossing of a marsh, that contained about ten inches of water. They had to build a raft to cross. A search of the woods has been made, but as yet no trace has been found.

Mr. Coleman is an experienced woodsman, having acted as a guide and having been otherwise employed in the woods nearly all his life. Today Coleman's son led a party of searchers into the forest. The fact that the elder Coleman is an experienced guide suggests the theory that either he or his companion is in some place where he would be difficult to find.

LOST BY GAMBLING

Young Bookkeeper Was Given a Verdict for \$5,000.

Bay City, Mich., Oct. 5. — Joseph T. Seelye, a well-known resident of this city, formerly bookkeeper for Hammond, Standish & Co., was today given a verdict in the circuit court of \$5,000 against Andrew C. Fisher, formerly the proprietor of a gambling place. Seelye claimed that he lost upwards of \$2,500 in Fisher's place and made a complaint. Fisher offered to pay, but denied the claim and would not pay. Thereupon Seelye began suit.

Some time ago Seelye inherited a lot of money from the estate of his father. He was paid when he attained his majority. With this he began playing roulette, and he lost it all.

BIG FEE IN CONTROVERSY

Dr. Doyen, Famous Paris Surgeon, Tells of Crocker Case.

Paris, Oct. 5. — "Rich patients pay for the poor nowadays," remarked Dr. Doyen today while talking with some colleagues about George Crocker's suit for the return of a large fee in the case started by the San Francisco millionaire.

Mrs. Crocker was brought to Dr. Doyen's private hospital for the removal of a cancerous growth. Dr. Doyen's services after a number of operations had declared Mrs. Crocker's case hopeless. Dr. Doyen refused to perform an operation on Mrs. Crocker, whose condition was most critical, but yielded, however, to the entreaties of her relatives and consented to apply his serum treatment as the only human hope.

Mrs. Crocker's relatives declined Dr. Doyen's proposal that she should reside in his private hospital while undergoing treatment, and insisted the surgeon and his chief assistant, Dr. See, should visit her at her hotel in the center of the city. The question of Dr. Doyen's fee was raised at the outset by Mrs. Crocker's relatives. When asked what his fee would be, Dr. Doyen replied: "I never discuss such questions. You must make the arrangement with M. Grenouillet, the superintendent of my private hospital."

When a marked improvement had taken place in Mrs. Crocker's condition M. Grenouillet made an appointment with Dr. Doyen for the purpose of paying, but failed to keep this appointment. Afterwards he telephoned the fee would be paid by his legal representative.
