

The correspondent outlines a reform scheme drafted by Viceroy Yuan Shih Kai, which, he says, is considerably favored by the throne. It includes a thorough reorganization of the Government, the abolition of the old system of appointing officials, the establishment of schools throughout the empire and the adoption of conscrip-
