**Congregation Applauded the Pastor
Unusual Incident in Methodist Church**

Rev. Mr. Rutledge Preached Sunday on Subject of Capital and Labor.
A most unusual incident occurred yesterday morning at the First Methodist Church, when Rev. W. L. Rutledge was accorded enthusiastic applause while expressing his views on the problems of capital and labor, in a sermon entitled "The Unreaped Corn."
Mr. Rutledge took his text from Leviticus, xix, 9: "And when ye reap the harvest of your land, thou shalt not wholly reap the corners of thy field, neither shalt thou gather the gleanings of thy harvest."
Mr. Rutledge showed that among the Jews, according to law, they were not allowed to strip their fields clean of all the grain.
"This provision was made," he said, "as a sense of justice and from a feeling that the poor they held was not theirs, but had been given to them by the Lord, and that they ought to give some share of their blessings to others less favored than themselves. If we in modern days would only apply the same principle to our charities, what a revolution would be worked in the whole world, and what an immense amount of need and suffering would be alleviated! The practical application of the same principle would indeed go a long way towards solving vexed questions between capital and labor. The demand of the laboring man has ever been for a sort of partnership in the business in which he is engaged, and a share in the profits. This is a not unreasonable request."
"The whole of the profits should not go to the capitalists of industry. A capitalist invests his money in a business. The workingman invests his skill and muscles. The employer pays the salary and the workingman draws his wages. The profits remain, and there is no law

**BISHOP WILLIAMS
ON CONFERENCE**
Tells of the Great Meeting of Anglicans in Old London Some Time Ago.

Bishop Williams gave a most interesting and practical address on some of the more important questions taken up at the Pan-Anglican Congress and Lambeth Conference, at St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday morning before a large congregation.
In commencing Bishop Williams extended his hearty thanks to all for the prayers that had been offered for himself and family while absent.
"The Pan-Anglican Congress," said his lordship, "was without any doubt the most important religious gathering that has ever been held in the history of the world. Some idea of the grandeur and unbounded enthusiasm that was displayed may be gathered when I tell you that every day of the sessions more than 30,000 people were in attendance. This even in the great city of London created no small stir. The Pan-Anglican Congress was attended by clergymen, missionaries and laymen from every district of the world. These men discussed every possible question that could arise in connection with church work. The Pan-Anglican Congress, while being the greatest meeting of its kind ever held, was distinctly unique in being the only gathering of its size that was ever held solely for the promotion of the work of Jesus Christ. Other gatherings have been held to fight for the cause of temperance, to arrange for crusades or for other purposes, but the Pan-Anglican Congress met and discussed nothing but matters for advancing church work. Papers were read by the highest authorities in the church work today, and were of the greatest practical value."
Not Like Lambeth Conference.
The Congress differed altogether from the Lambeth Conference, only bishops were in attendance at the conference, and at this gathering resolutions were passed as a direct outcome of the general discussion of the congress.
"The three things that struck me most were the unity, enthusiasm and courage exhibited throughout the conference. Questions of every kind were discussed with a frankness and freedom that is rarely heard in a gathering of the clergy, and all were there for the best of purposes."
"By the observation of the Christian ideas was meant people who think they are Christians, but have only received a portion of the truth, and have failed to grasp many of the most important ideals of Christianity. The members present spoke with the

in heaven or in earth by which all the profits should be claimed and taken by the capitalist. Yet he invariably takes them.
"Some day workmen will be given a share in the profits that they have worked to produce. Profit-sharing has even been introduced into many of the largest and most successful industries in the United States and England, and the scheme has worked admirably. It has gone far further than any other measure ever did in settling the differences between capital and labor. Men are inclined to forget that Sunday belongs to God and not to man. It was set apart by Him to prevent men from becoming mere machines through work. One thing we must learn is that we are debtors to the people with whom we in comparison have superior advantages, and when we learn this and apply it, a great deal of unhappiness will be eliminated from the world."
Rev. J. G. Inkster delivered the second of a series of sermons on the parables of Christ at the First Presbyterian Church last evening, taking as his subject "The Taxes and Wheat." Mr. Inkster showed that no matter how hard we may try to perform good works, there will always be those who will try to discourage us. Good and evil always have a struggle, and always will be side by side. There are good and bad people in the church, in business and in every field of life, and it is just as useless to try and weed them out altogether, as it would be to try and weed out all the taxes without destroying the wheat. Good and evil invariably have their reward, and God has chosen his own way of dealing with sinners.

Rev. Mr. Hutton conducted the services at Wellington Street Methodist Church yesterday morning in the absence of Rev. Humphrey Graham. Mr. Hutton preached an evangelic sermon on "The Overcoming of Sin." Next Sunday the Epworth League of the church will hold a big rally.
The question of uniting the churches of the world was also given a great deal of attention, and as a result an offer will be made to the Presbyterian Church to unite with the Church of England, taking as a basis the articles drawn up in 1610. Believe we are nearer than ever before in having a united church. Thousands of missionaries were present from all over the world, and the clergy had it brought home to them that never before has their been so many opportunities of extending Christ's kingdom. So many new missions fields naturally means "missions drain on the clergy, and the greatest difficulty is being experienced in getting enough men to go to the different fields. This is a question that touches life and not an abstract matter. We have here in our midst a training school that has sent out a very large number of well-trained men."
"I refer to Huron College, and I rejoice that the city has now taken over the Western University, and left us free to give our full attention to the college."

Help for the College.
"You will, at a not very distant date, be asked to do your share in helping on the great work of aiding in keeping the mission fields supplied by helping the college. I was informed, as were many others, to find that a large majority of the most vigorous bishops in the conference were strong advocates of socialism. By socialism I mean Christian socialism, the kind that looks to giving every man an opportunity of living the best life, and not anarchism. To men of business and commerce, the resolutions were particularly applicable, in that they brought forth most strongly the fact that all are stewards, and each has a responsibility to the community in which he lives. The resolutions were also very strong in urging different governments not to allow any trade of a degrading nature to be carried on within their territory."
Religion in the Schools.
"Religious education in the public schools was also taken up. I have heard many times spoken upon this before. Good citizenship invariably depends upon strong character, and character is formed by religion. The school life of a child is one of the most important periods of its existence, for it is then that the formative state and religious influences that stay with it in after life. I am glad to tell you that steps will be taken to have religion taught in the schools of the world."

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**TUMULT AT A
BORDEN MEETING**
Hostile Element at Montreal Refused to Hear Personal Grievances.
**VIKING FUNERAL
SHIP IS FOUND**
Indications All Point to Fact That Boat Belonged to Ninth Century.

Montreal, Sept. 20.—A most regrettable occurrence took place at the Conservative mass meeting tonight in the Monument Nationale. The Conservative active leader and his chief lieutenant in Quebec, Mr. F. D. Monk, were refused a hearing by an audience that kept up a persistent uproar until a squad of police was marched into the galleries, with instructions to put out all persons who refused to cease interrupting the speakers. The untoward event is regretted even more by the Liberal leaders in the city than by the Conservatives, because Mr. Borden and his friends will no doubt seek to load the responsibility for the uproar on the Liberal party organization. Mr. Borden, referring to the row, expressed his regret at the exhibition of bad manners, and said it was the first time in twelve years he had been interrupted by the audience. The trouble began when Mr. F. D. Monk was speaking. Although the latter is Mr. Borden's right-hand man, and leader of the Quebec Conservatives, he failed to get a hearing, and he was shouting his hoarse voice in his efforts to make an impression was forced to take his seat. Mr. Borden was the next speaker, and was given a good reception by those on the platform and about half the audience. He was patiently listened to for the first five minutes, but when he began a recitation of his personal grievances against the members of the Government the interruptions commenced.
He was told to discuss something of importance. He tried again and again to proceed, but cat calls, whistling, shouting and stamping interrupted his efforts. He finally seated himself on the corner of the platform, and said he "would wait till midnight if necessary." He then turned to the audience and said he would address himself to the reporters, and began to do so. The uproar continued to such an extent that he was forced to take his seat.
The chairman, ex-Mayor Ekers, and Mr. Laporte both tried to get the audience to listen. Their combined pleadings failed, and they then got those who were seated on the platform to rise and cheer again and again for their leaders.
At the same time a squad of 35 policemen were marched into the gallery. After that whenever any person made any objection the police hustled him out. For the remainder of his address Mr. Borden was heard in silence. Even his own followers on the platform failed to cheer him. Over half of his time was taken up with a recital of personal recriminations against different members of the Government, and with an elaborate defence of Mr. Hugh Graham.

ANTI-GERMAN RIOTS.
Vienna, Sept. 21.—Anti-German demonstrations, in which a large body of Slovenians have been taking part for several evenings, culminated last night at Liabach, in an attack upon the police, who were made the targets for stones, glasses and other missiles. Finally the police fired a volley, killing two of the rioters, and wounding four. They then charged the crowd with drawn sabres, and succeeded in putting them to flight. Later the rioters wrecked the German Tonhalle.
