J. Tire Company, Hartford Rubber Works, Continental Caoutchouc Company, and Morgan & Wright. Independents Blacklisted. Not only have these firms combined to monopolize the tire market, the petialleged to have placed on the blacklist certain dealers, including the Motor Bloc Import Company, who are not members of the association. The result of this blacklisting, he claims, is that these outside wholesale dealers have to pay retail prices to the manufacturers, who conduct both a wholesale and retail bus!-The Motor Bloc Import Company, President Kaufman stated, is anxious t**o** start a suit against these manufacturers to find out the exact nature of their
