**ELEPHANT BAND
IN A MAD ROMP**

Nine Big Bulls Stampede at Danville, Ill., and Do a Great Amount of Damage.

Danville, Ill., April 27.—Several persons were injured and much property was damaged today by nine elephants, which stampeded just after they had been unloaded from a car after several hours' ride from Chicago.

A large bull elephant made a break for liberty, bowling over the keeper and escaping.

The animal was followed by seven other bulls, which ran below through the streets and across the fields. Later, while the entire force of men and keepers was engaged in the unusual sport of hunting elephants in automobiles, a female elephant escaped.

For several hours the elephants were kept under guard by all the attacks of the circus, all the city policemen and the more venturesome citizens.

The elephants at first moved in a line, but soon separated. They stopped for nothing, except brick and stone buildings. Such small frame structures, coal sheds, fences and trees, as came in their path, were pushed over, trodden down, uprooted and thrown to one side.

Killed a Horse.

At the home of Wm. Miller, three elephants found insufficient room to pass between the summer kitchen and the house, so they charged into the kitchen, frightening the persons therein from the table, but injuring no one. At the home of Jos. Peebles, an overturning a shed and killing a horse, were the only damage done.

Peoples and hurled his against the side of his house. Peoples is in a critical condition.

Farney, O'Neil, a liverman, was thrown from his horse by the elephants as they dashed down a side street in front of his team. P. Crab, one of the keepers, while assisting in standing three of the bulls, after their capture, was hurled against the side of a barn and injured. Several other persons were slightly injured, mostly because of horses frightened by the elephants in their flight during the stampede.

More than 100 homes were damaged to some extent by the elephants, but the damage will probably not exceed \$10,000.

Several track gardens and orchards were partly ruined in the outskirts of the city.

One elephant was still at large to night, north of Danville, with a force of attendants with trusty elephants after it.

**CONTROL OF RATES
STOPS AT BOUNDARY**

Ottawa, April 27.—Negotiations are being carried on by the Government here with that of the United States concerning the joint authority of the Canadian railway commission and the interstate commerce commission.

There are several international roads, but the courts have decided that the jurisdiction of these commissions is wholly within points in the respective countries. They cannot, for instance, lay an order respecting rates and apply it beyond the boundary, though the line affected may extend there.

The negotiations being conducted have in view an understanding for joint action by the two commissions by way of the Premier's boundary of each other over lines crossing the boundary.

**QUEBEC PROVINCE
STICKS TO PULP LAW**

Washington, April 27.—Efforts of the United States to have modified in some way the new pulpwood policy of the province of Quebec have been unsuccessful. United States Consul General at Ottawa, Mr. Premier Lacombe, has informed that that Quebec Province declined to modify the new law.

This measure prohibits the export of timber cut on crown land, except in manufactured form, such as pulp and commercial lumber. Considerable loss to American paper mills will result from the new law, which goes into effect on May 1.

IS SHE A KIDNAPPER?

Woman Detained at New York by the Request of Montreal Police.

New York, April 27.—A well-dressed woman, who said she was Mrs. Alfred Grouge, No. 421 Laval street, Montreal, was arrested on board the afternoon train as she was about to sail for Jacksonville, Fla. With the woman was a 2-year-old child. Mrs. Grouge was taken to police headquarters.

The complainant against Mrs. Grouge is the Children's Society of this city. Mr. Walsh called on Inspector O'Leary in charge of the detective bureau, and showing him a photograph he had received from Mrs. Skroder, of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children in Montreal, in which the latter said that Mrs. Grouge had kidnapped a 2-year-old Yvonne Duval, from the home of its foster parents in Canada, and had left for this city on her way to Augustine, Fla. In Jefferson Market police court, Magistrate O'Connor held Mrs. Grouge until tomorrow to allow communication with the Canadian authorities.

The child was turned over to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Mrs. Grouge was incessantly, and expressed great surprise over her arrest. She said she had adopted the child, and showed a Superior Court order ordering Mrs. Laporte, who had charge of Yvonne Duval in Montreal, to turn over the child to her.

Walsh explained that, in a telephone call today, Skroder said that she was giving the child to Mrs. Grouge. Mrs. Laporte had changed her mind after inspecting the former's home, which she did not consider fit for the child.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY.

Montreal, April 27.—After spending the night in the police court cells as the result of finding of the coroner's jury in the death of Bonnie Smith on Victoria Bridge on Sunday evening, Louis Dionne and Neiffer, his chauffeur, were today released on \$4,000 bail each. They pleaded not guilty to the charge of causing the death of the woman. Their preliminary trial will commence next Tuesday.

**A TAILLESS COMET
SAY OTTAWANS**

Ottawa, April 27.—The first view of Halley's comet by the naked eye was obtained in Ottawa this morning by Observers Nox and Melton from the top of the Citizen newspaper building. The comet was picked up at 3:35 a.m., but owing to a cloudy sky the view lasted only a few minutes. It was of a reddish orange color and very brilliant, appearing in the heavens as a ball of fire somewhat larger than an ordinary star. No tail was apparent nor was the appendage to be seen even when powerful glasses were trained on the comet.

QUEEN'S CONVOCATION

Honorary Degrees Conferred on Several Leading Educationists.

Kingston, April 27.—Convocation proceedings at Queen's were especially interesting this year, owing to the presence of Ontario's Premier, Sir J. P. Whitney, Hon. P. C. O'Leary, and Hon. W. Duff. The proceedings began at 2:30 p.m. and were thronged.

The first event was the installation of Sir Sandford Fleming, C. M. G., as chancellor for the tenth term of three years each.

Over 150 persons were laureate from the various faculties, and honorary degrees were conferred as follows: D. D.—Rev. Andrew T. Love, B. A., of St. Andrew's Church, Quebec.

L.L.D.—Jr. William H. Park, professor of bacteriology and hygiene in the University of New York.

Prof. R. T. Glover, lecturer in classics in St. John's College, Cambridge, England, and Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education for Ontario, also received honorary degrees.

The Premier was one of the speakers at the proceedings.

Immediately after the convocation, the corner stone of the new chemistry building at Queen's was laid by Sir James P. Whitney.

**SHOT ONE WIFE
BEAT ANOTHER**

Paroled Convict May Go Back to Finish Twenty-Year Term.

Toronto, April 27.—Samuel Rowatt, who in May, 1897, was sentenced to 20 years in penitentiary for shooting his wife, and who was released on parole in May, 1916, appeared before the police magistrate this morning, charged with assault on his second wife, Elizabeth Rowatt. The woman said Rowatt struck her two weeks after their marriage a year ago, and threatened to take her life, and that since then he had assaulted her whenever he was displeased.

Rowatt denied the woman's charges and said she was to blame for any trouble. She followed him on the streets, he declared, and called the attention of the neighbors to the fact that he had murdered his first wife.

Rowatt was remanded for a week, pending the result of communications with the department of justice regarding the disposition of the case.
