

IMPORTERS OF CEMENT TO PAY FULL DUTY

Government Decides to Put the Schedule Back at the Old Figure.

ment will pay full duty after tomorrow. Owing to demand from the West the Government on June 1 reduced the duty on cement by half, or rather agreed to return half the duty collected. In effect this reduced the duty from 52 cents a barrel to 26 cents a barrel. There were large importations at the reduced rate, and protests were received from the Canadian cement nanufacturers. TURK COMMANDER MAKES READY TO TAKE OFFENSIVE

Adrianople While Holding Bulgars Off on Left.

SERVIAN CAVALRY HAVE A SUCCESS

Indications Are That a Decisive Battle Is Being Fought Today in Balkans.

[Canadian Press.] London, Oct. 30. - The Bulgarian army was defeated by the Turks at Visa, Remil and Serai yesterday, according to an official dispatch received by the Ottoman embassy here. The Turkish loss totalled 800 killed and wounded.

London, Oct. 30 .- Perhaps the decisive battle of the war is proceeding somewhere east of the line from Constantinople to Adrianople between the Turkish and Bulgarian armies, and heavy fighting also is taking place around Adrianople itself.

Beyond the fact that a clash has come, however, the general staffs of the Turkish and Bulgarian armies are keeping the outside world ignorant of details, No news has come through from the scene of action except the dispatch from Nazim Pasha, the Turkish commanderin-chief, saying: "The position is favorable to the Turkish." While admitting that they have to depend on mere rumors and suppositions, military critics here are inclined to believe that the Turkish army is at last ready to take the offensive and has a chance of retrieving
