GRAND TRUNK IS NOT BLUFFING, SAYS MR. WARMAN

If Electrification Carries the Company Will Surely Build to Port Burwell.

MATTER IS A VITAL ONE

Company Will Handle Its Own Coal If It Cannot Secure a Lease.

"Coal is to a railway just what food is to an individual," said Mr. Cy Warman, publicity agent for the Grand Trunk, who was in the city for a short time yesterday morning.

"It is for that reason that the Grand Trunk Railway does not wish to have anyone but itself handle the coal which comes to it at present over the London and Port Stanley Railway. This securing of coal is a vital matter to the railway. The amount is to be doubled within a short time, and the handling of it is such a large matter that the Grand Trunk, being itself in the railway business, would look foolish if it allowed someone else to handle it."

Will Build Line.

"The fact is that the Grand Trunk will build its line to Port Burwell if it cannot secure a lease of the London and Port Stanley. I have been a resident of London for many years, and I can say as a citizen that I would advise the people to go slowly before taking a step that will deny their railway 80 per cent of the freight business it at present handles."

"The city of London would never have known of the Grand Trunk's intentions had it not been for the request that was made by businessmen. 'I have been with the Grand Trunk for some time. I have never seen the railway take a stand on any matter that it did not follow out. Just as surely as this road is electrified the business of the Grand Trunk will be lost.'"
