

NATIONAL HONOR OF THE JAPANESE IS NOW AT STAKE

General Regret Felt at Tokic Over Action of Governor Johnson.

Government Is Having a Hard Time Trying to Pacify Public Opinion.

Tokio, May 20.—The news that the California alien land bill had been igned by Governor Johnson was reeived here with regret, although it. had been discounted in official and non-official circles. It was hoped up to the last moment, however, that Washington's intervention would prove successful. The newspapers published extra editions with the announcement hat the bill had been signed.

The efforts of the Japanese Government are concentrated at present on pacifying public opinion. Since the death of the old Japanese emperor the steadily diminished in resisting the growing influence of public opinion. and the spirit of democracy through-

Thanked For Efforts.

The secretary of the United States embassy visited Baron Noboaki Makino, the Japanese foreign minister, to day, and reiterated the determination of the United States Government to exert every effort in order to friendly and satisfactory solution the question. He emphasized the fact that it was a Californian and not an American question, and thanked the Japanese Government for its friendli-

ness, and for its attempts to restrain the excitable public opinion of Japan, A prominent official said today: "The Japanese people feel that their national honor is involved. The present uestion will be solved peacefully, but what is needed to assure the permanency of our traditional friendship is a change of heart in some Americans to-
