## RAILWAY BOARD ORDERS

All Heavy Street Cars in Hamilton Must Be Equipped.

[Canadian Press.]

Toronto, Nov. 19 .- The Hamilton street cars of the heavier type will all have to be equipped with air,

brakes inside of six months: This decision was arrived at today by the Ontario municipal and railway board, following the hearing today of Magnus Sinclair, one of the members of the general executive of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees' of America, to compel the company to equip their cars with air brake.

The application was supported by argument and evidence to show that \$50 for the Children's Aid Society from hand brakes were a menace to the public safety, while most laborious for motormen to operate.

Supt. E. P. Coleman and G. E. Waller, general superintendent radial lines, gave evidence to show that hand brakes were safer, as with them motormen exercised greater care in controlling their cars than with air brakes, while there was not the personal inconvertience of passengers being tossed about the car by too speedy an application, as with the air brakes. The order was made directing the company to equip all its cars of the heavier type with air brakes and six months agreed upon as the time in which the work is to be done.
