On the other hand, within the last six weeks rather reliable reports stated that some 50,000 Germans were being sent down the Danube, while several divisions of Turks were being removed from the Drobudja front and sent to Galicia. The only point, therefore, whence Macedonian armies could have been withdrawn was the Macedonian front. London, Sept. 14 .- "Since the beginning of the offensive on the western front, the French and British on the Somme, and the French at Verdun have been able to announce the capture of 260 guns, 647 machine guns, and, roughly, 54,000 men. These results already constitute a victory, and it is quite evident the French do not intend to remain where they are, either on the north or south of the Somme."
