TWO MEET DEATH IN REVOLVER DUEL
 Double Tragedy Follows Interview Peace River Officer Has.

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 25.—A double fatality, in which a provincial constable and his assailant were killed, is reported from Kinuso, in the Peace River district, following a gun-fight near that town Tuesday night.
 Constable Osgood was attacked by R. H. Beagles during an interview concerning a traffic charge, and was stabbed three times in the hip. He immediately opened fire on his assailant with a revolver. Beagles also commenced to fire on the constable who received five bullet wounds, dying within a few hours.
 Beagles was shot three times and died 20 minutes after the shooting.

TWIN CITIES TO BUILD \$500,000 UNION SCHOOL

Kitchener and Waterloo Plan Combination Collegiate and Technical Institute.

HIRE WINDSOR ARCHITECT
 Father Wey Celebrates Silver Anniversary of Ordination At St. Clements.

[Special to London Advertiser.]
 KITCHENER, Jan. 25.—Members of the Kitchener-Waterloo Collegiate Board, the industrial advisory committee and the municipal councils of Kitchener and Waterloo will meet an special conference here on Feb. 6, for the purpose of taking up the question of building a combination collegiate and technical institute that will cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

The general plan favored is to erect a building that will not only provide amply for future growth of the twin communities, but will also be an institution in every way fitting the importance of the two municipalities. Architect Coons of Windsor will be at the meeting, and will submit preliminary plans.

Expect No Objection.
 It is expected, in view of the fact that the government will bear a 25 per cent share in the construction of the technical end of the building, that both Waterloo and Kitchener will find no objection to immediately proceeding with preliminary steps. It is confidently expected that the objection to the proposition, which emanated from Waterloo about eighteen months ago, will be absent from the conference on Feb. 6.

Rev. Father Joseph E. Wey celebrated the silver anniversary of his ordination to the holy priesthood at his rectory in St. Clements here, Fr. Wey has been the pastor of the St. Clements Church for the past ten years. The ceremonies in connection with the jubilee were attended by a number of Western Ontario priests.

Claims Hydrants Froze.
 Controversy has started here between the city fire department and the water commission regarding the condition of the hydrants at the fire of the Holm Apartments here Tuesday.

It appears that Fire Chief Guerin insists that the hydrants were frozen, and blames the water commission for not keeping the hydrants open. The commission deny that the hydrants were frozen. It is expected an investigation will be held to clear up the matter.

URGES DEVELOPMENT OF WATERWAYS PLAN
 Washington, Jan. 25.—Recommendation for the construction of the St. Lawrence-Great Lakes waterway project was voted by the subcommittee on waterways transportation under the general transportation committee of the national agricultural conference here today.

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INSURE AGAINST LACK OF POWER AT BRANTFORD

Hydro Commissioners Report Load Has Been Increased by 1,000 Horsepower.

CUT PRIVATE COMPANIES
 [Special to London Advertiser.]

BRANTFORD, Jan. 25.—The annual statement of the local hydro commission when it appears next month will be most encouraging, it is assured. During the past year the load carried in Brantford has increased by approximately 1,000 horsepower, and now amounts to 5,700 horsepower in all. Conditions considered, this is regarded as most satisfactory.

During the war the commission exerted every effort to increase the local capacity to handle the demands of the munition manufacturing. A capacity of about 3,800 horsepower was built up. When peace came it was thought that the local department would be left with a lot of unnecessary power equipment on hand, but such has not been the case, and the figure of 5,700 shows that since the war the power demand has increased nearly 50 per cent. This increase is considered permanent, being the result of natural industrial and domestic demands.

Customers Increase.
 The use of electric power in the home is increasing daily, according to Superintendent Catton of the local hydro commission department. For instance, in Brantford today there are 665 electric stoves in use. Nearly 1,900 new customers were added last year.

The installation of the new 50,000 horsepower generator at Chippawa, which has just been put into commission, will solve the power problem for the hydro throughout the province, said Mr. Catton this morning.

There are three such generators to be put to work, when the hydro commission of Ontario will be independent of the Canadian Niagara Power Company and other concerns. These Niagara concerns have had a great deal of difficulty in the past, during the winter months, owing to ice troubles. This will now be eliminated, and the provincial commission will be able to dispense with power purchased from private companies.

Have Wrong Impression.
 "There are a large number of men in Brantford who have sacrificed hundreds of dollars, hard earned, and invested in their homes, through ignorance of the laws," declared Mayor Wedlake this morning, referring to the fact that men whose savings were all tied up in their homes had sometimes given up possession and otherwise compromised themselves.

The mayor continued that in talking of the matter with Alderman Harley, the latter had promised assistance, and today Alderman Harley announced that local lawyers are prepared to give free legal advice to prevent repetition of such cases. The mayor urged that all men whose property rights were threatened because of non-payment on account of unemployment take their case to the relief board, and legal assistance will then be forthcoming without cost to them, the legal fraternity giving their services in this regard free of cost.

FREED ON PAYING CLAIMS.
 Blenheim, Jan. 25.—Stanley Munn, who was out on bail under a charge of getting money under false pretences, satisfied the court Tuesday by paying up all claims against him and the costs of the court, amounting to over \$100, and was freed.

POLICE PROBE AT BRANTFORD WILL PROCEED

Attorney-General Appoints W. D. Gregory To Conduct Investigation.

EARLY START EXPECTED
 Magistrate Livingston Given Week's Leave of Absence At Own Request.

[Special to London Advertiser.]
 BRANTFORD, Jan. 25.—W. D. Gregory, chairman of the Public Service Commission of Ontario, has been appointed by the attorney-general's department to conduct the investigation into local police conditions, it was announced by Attorney-General Raney this morning. In communication with Mr. Raney by long distance telephone, it was learned that the appointment had been made, and that Mr. Jennings, K.C., of Toronto, who will act for the municipality, is now free to go ahead with the investigation.

Given Leave of Absence.
 It is understood that Magistrate Livingston has asked the attorney-general's department to be relieved of duty for one week, and that he has been granted leave of absence for that time. In police court this morning all cases were remanded for one week.

Mayor Wedlake, when informed of the statement of the attorney-general to the effect that the appointment of Mr. Gregory had been made, had nothing to say other than that the matter was now in the hands of the province. Mr. Jennings, K.C., who has been retained by the city to conduct the probe, he was not in a position to say on what date the investigation would commence. Following the magistrate's action in remanding all cases up before him this morning it is considered likely that the ball will be started rolling at once.

Probe To Be Sweeping.
 Mr. Raney stated this morning that it was unlikely that any of the local justices of the peace would be asked to fulfill the duties of the magistracy during the investigation. He hinted that pro tem appointments might be made from Toronto.

The investigation, it is stated by those in close touch with the case, will not be confined to consideration of the three officials who were temporarily suspended some months ago. It will be very sweeping, and embody consideration of the entire police department's workings.

Mr. Gregory is well known in Brantford. He is a nephew of the late Principal A. H. Dymond of the school for the blind, this city. He was articled as a youth to the firm of Wilson and Smyth, which had offices in the courthouse in those days. Proceeding to Toronto, he graduated from Osgoode Hall in 1884. He has had a brilliant career in Toronto law and provincial politics.
