ALBERTA WHEAT GROWERS ARE SIGNING CONTRACTS

Calgary, Aug. 23.—Approximately 400 signed wheat contracts were received at the head offices of the Alberta Co-operative Wheat Producers, Limited, this morning. This boosted the total number of contracts to approximately 1,500 for a total acreage of about 200,000.

Reports from all parts of the province so far indicate that at least 75 per cent of the 83,000 wheat growers are signing the contracts.
