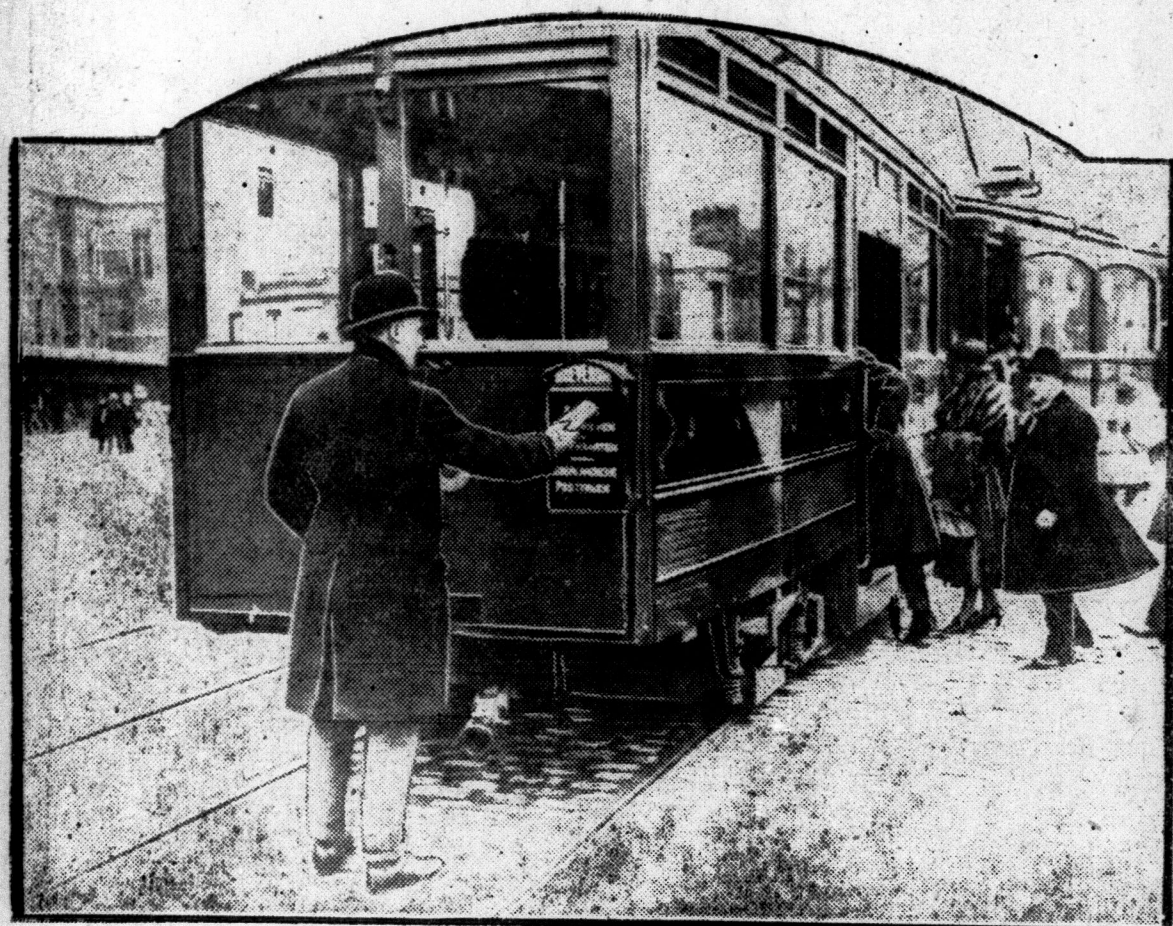


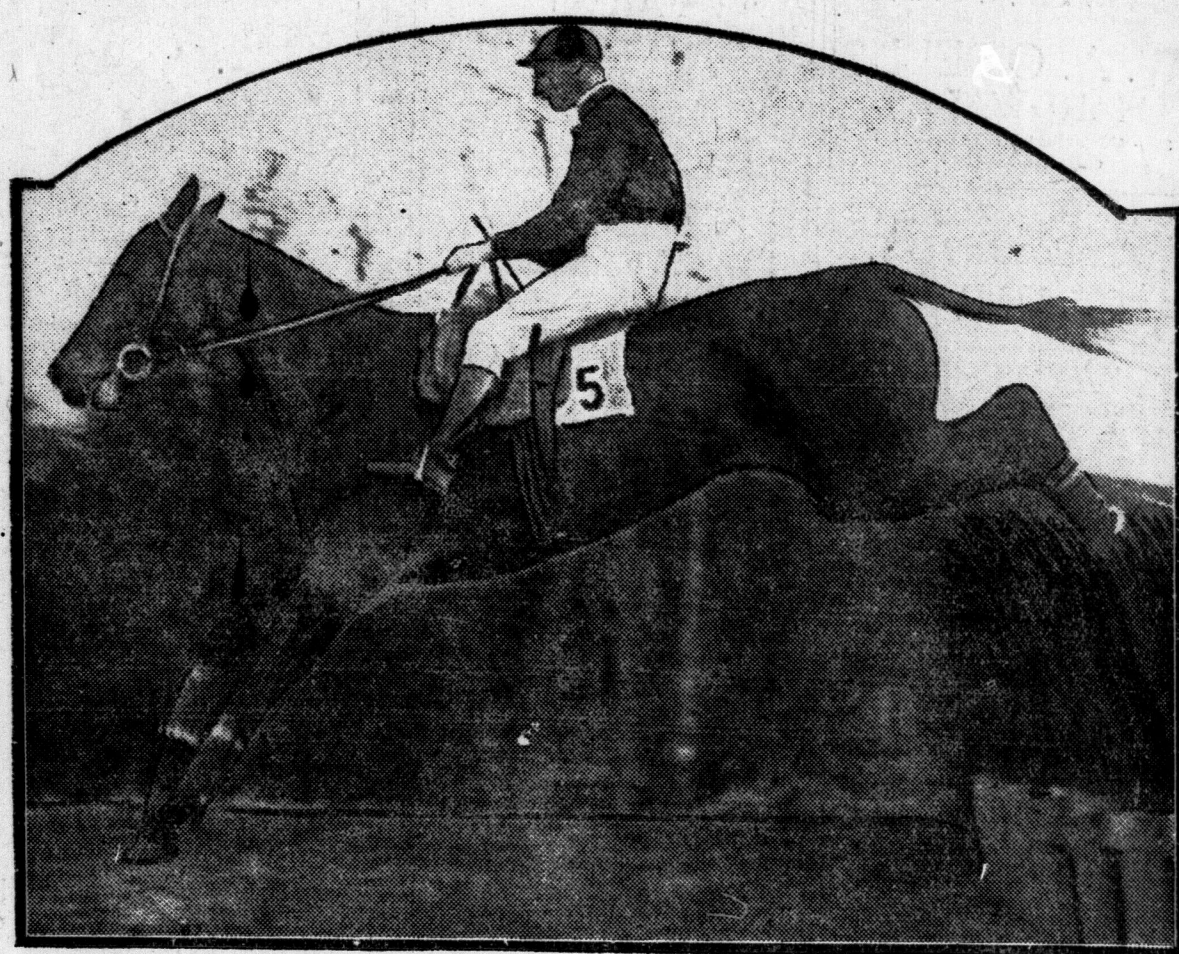

William T. Tilden, Jr., photographed with Miss Brenda Hedstrom at the recent tennis tournament held at Chestnut Hill, Mass.



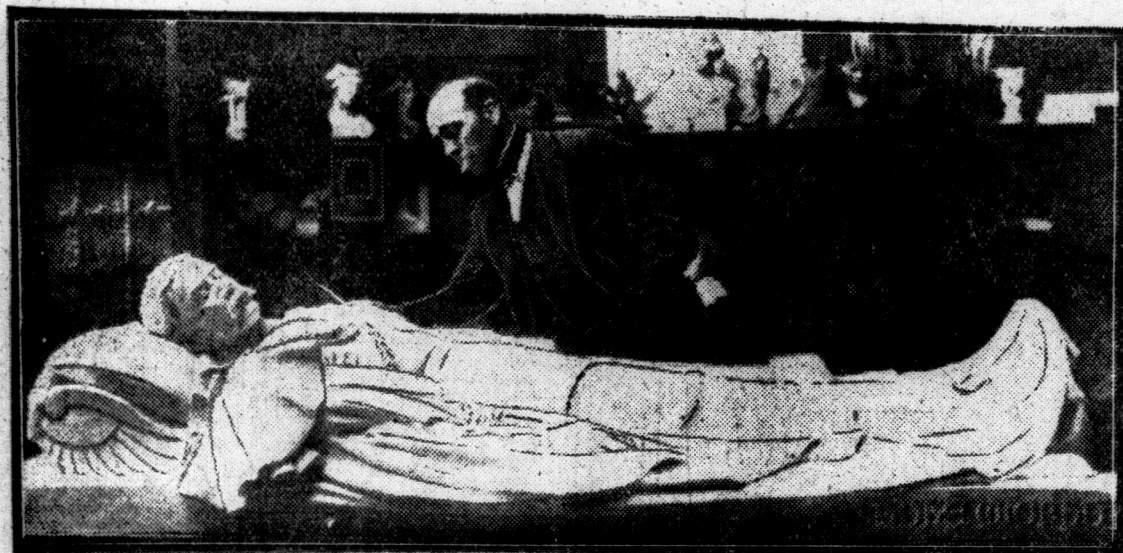
