Premier Drury Attends Strong Gathering of Executives at Headquarters.

LEADER WINS FAVOR

Belief Prevails Old Parties Are Trying To Destroy the Movement.

Special to The Advertiser. Toronto, April 26 .- That matters are in a state of crisis within the U. F. O. as a result of the Hicks charges and the attitude of the Farmers' Sun towards the Drury Government is indicated by the fact that the U. F. O. executive is holding a two-day meeting in Toronto to deal with the political situation.

Premier Drury left the Parliament Buildings at 9:40 this morning to at tend a meeting of the executive in the U. F. O. headquarters. There he was brought face to face with J. J. Morrison, the virile secretary of the U. F. O., along with President Amos, and a score or more other leaders of the Agrarian movement in Ontario. The executive is said to be composed of 74 members, and to-day's meeting was unusually well at-

The temper of the executive members does not seem to be unfavorable to Premier Drury. The prevailing opinion seems to be that Mr. Drury has carried on the work of govern-ment with credit to the farmers who put him in power, and in spite of very great difficulties. The assur-ances he gave in his Milton address are considered ample for anyone who has been concerned about keeping the F. O. political movement intact and independent of both old parties Indeed, a few are inclined to think Mr. Drury went farther than he



Situation at Asbestos Corporation, Thedford Mines, Becomes Serious.

ASK FEDERAL AID

Mob Hurle Stones, Then Turns Fire Hose on Constables.

Canadian Press Despatch Thetford Mines, Que., April 26 .-The ejectment of forty special constables from the offices of the Asbestos Corporation by a mob of some 1,500 miners last night and the second forced departure from the town of Colonel MacNutt, as general manager of the corporation, are the two outstanding developments of the tumultuous situation here. The constables who had been sent from Montreal by a detective agency, fol-lowing the first ejectment of Colonel MacNutt from the town and his re-turn, were forced to capitulate to the mob and leave for Sherbrooke after they had been attacked with stones and a fire hose and had fired blank revolver shots over the heads of the insurgent miners.

County Treasurer's Report Shows Receipts of \$229,137, Expenses \$240,020

ROADS COST \$10,000

Broader Educational Policy Is Reflected in Increased Expense.

Nearly a quarter of a million dol lars was expended in the County of Middlesex in January, February and March of this year. According to the quarterly report prepared by Capt. Thomas E. Robson the actual figures

are \$240,020.06.

Of this amount, \$229,137.62 was expended for salaries, grants and chari-ties, administration of justice, maintenance of county buildings, education and other general purposes while the roads cost \$10,882.44.

The receipts for the first quarter were \$229,137.62, the largest item being current loans, which reached \$120,000. The Ontario Government grant amounted to \$90,960.08, while the registry offices, county rates and non-resident land taxes brought in \$13,626.67. The sum of \$444 in fees was collected from auteioneers, ped-dlers and junk dealers.

The county paid out \$476.07 in constables' fees during January, February and March, while jury payments totalled \$1,888. Expenditures for jali salaries were \$2,254.96, and other jail and courthouse expenses amounted to

That the educational policy of the county is becoming broader all the time is shown in the fact that during the first quarter the Middlesex schools cost the county \$38,381.92.

The high schools and collegiate institutes receipts were \$19,749.23, the

maintenance of continuation schools cost \$17,114.84, and inspectors' salar ies amounted to \$857.40. Specia tive grants for separate schools totalled \$40.42. The sums expended for public school libraries were \$279.65 and \$10, respectively.
