The intentions of the Ontario athletic commission regarding school athletics sound good as long as the intention to centralize control in Toronto is not behind the idea. The initiative for the formation of other associations modeled after the Wossa and for bringing these associations into provincial competition should come from the Ontario commission, but thereafter a provincial executive for secondary schools should be formed.

The Ontario commission, however, has shown remarkably good judgment in everything that it has undertaken, and its zeal in the promotion of school athletics undoubtedly marks a new era for track and field events in Ontario. The tours of Walter Knox with his motion pictures of athletes in action have been of immense value, especially as they have made up in a measure for the lack of coaching with which small schools are always handicapped.

An entirely new set of slow motion pictures has been taken of Ontario's best athletes, girls and boys, and these will be shown through the schools. They run the whole gamut of track and field.


