# BRITAIN LIMITS **MOVE IN MOROCCO**

Austen Chamberlain Outlines Govt.'s Position With Respect to Co-Operation.

Associated Press Despatch. Fez, French Morocco, July 15 .-The French today defeated two attacks by Abd-el-Krim's Riffians on positions protecting Fez and Taza.

Associated Press Despatch. London, July 15 .- Foreign secretary Austen Chamberlain, outlined Great Britain's position in regard to the Moroccan situation, in replying to a question in the House of Commons today. The French and Spanish govern-

ments, he explained, had proposed the co-operation of British naval forces in the surveillance of contraband arms traffic in the territorial waters of Tangier. The extension of the territorial limits of the French and

territorial limits of the French and Spanish zones to six miles into the sea instead of three, and the landing of contingents of troops by the three countries at Tangler for the protection of the city also was proposed. The British government, Mr. Chamberlain declared, was ready to carry out the obligations of the Tangler convention, and to co-operate in the suppression of contraband traffic in the territorial waters of the district; but preferred not to participate in any action outside these waters, nor could it acquiesce in the three-mile limit. The British government also opposed the proposal for the despatch of troops to Tangler because such action might possibly provoke an attack upon the town by the Riffs.
