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## TOWN OFFICIALS ARE APPOINTED

By-law Changed and Officials Now Chosen—Assessors Not Named.

A meeting of the town council was held on Monday night in the fire station, His Worship Mayor McKay in the Chair with Councillors Moores, Duncan, St. Onge, Bisset, Wallace, Chamberlain and Patterson present. The minutes of the meeting held on Jan. 31st, were read and confirmed. On motion the regular order of business was suspended to hear the report of the By-laws and Legislation Committee.

Councillor Bisset from the above committee reported that owing to the date of holding our town elections having been changed it would be necessary to change the date for the holding of the annual meeting and arrange a date closely following the town elections. Report received and adopted.

The council then went into Committee of the Whole, His Worship appointing Councillor Duncan chairman. On returning to the council chamber, Councillor Duncan reported recommending a change in the by-law fixing the date of the annual meeting the first Tuesday in February. On motion, report received and adopted.

On motion the by-law was given a third reading and now declared in force.

Returning to the regular order of business a communication was read from Wm. Savidant asking to be retained as Poor Commissioner.—Laid on table.

A communication from Thos. Deberts with reference to his having been taxed \$18.88 was referred to the Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A communication from W. E. Boulet was read in which he complained of being overcharged for light, and requested that a new meter be installed. Referred to Electric Light Committee.

On motion of Councillor Wallace the council endorsed a strong resolution approving of the Campbellton Board of Trade's action in pressing for the erection of a passenger bridge across the Restigouche river opposite Campbellton.

The usual departmental accounts were then gone into and ordered paid. Councillor Moores from the Fire Committee reported that some \$4,277 worth of the fire equipment ordered by last year's council had been received from the Fire Equipment Co., and that there yet remained some \$498 worth yet to be received under the contract of sale entered into. Considerable discussion took place over the matter in which practically all the councillors took part. It was finally decided to let the matter of making a \$1000 payment on the contract lay over until the next night of meeting.

The Electric Light Committee was authorized to look into the matter of purchasing a good general work-horse and report back to council.

## LIBERALS WIN IN WEST PETERBORO

G. N. Gordon Elected by Over 1200—Want General Election.

Peterboro, Ont., Feb. 17.—The by-election today in the partly urban and partly rural constituency of West Peterboro resulted in the defeat of the government candidate, E. Denno, by well over one thousand plurality. G. N. Gordon, Liberal, was the successful candidate. There were also in the field, a Labor, a Farmer, and an Independent candidate, namely: Messrs. McMurray, Campbell and Burnham.

## Chatham Wins Fast Game Against C'ton

Rink Crowded With North Shore Fans and Much Excitement Manifested—Campbellton Played Game Under Protest.

The Chatham special train arrived last night about half past six with the large promenade and balcony above was packed to its full capacity. It was without a doubt the largest crowd that ever turned out to see a hockey match, a conservative estimate placing the number at 1800 and the fair sex who were very much in evidence, showed more enthusiasm than the men, if such were possible.

The game was delayed nearly two hours trying to agree on referees. The Campbellton team had word from the President of the League that Staples was appointed and Chatham brought Brown with them and insisted on double referee system. It was at last agreed to play under protest, Campbellton protesting against Brown acting as a referee, and also against Shorty Yeno's name being on the Chatham list of players.

The game started fast and furious from the face-off. After fighting for six or seven minutes Currie, by a nice rush, scored for Chatham, and Spratt showed one in very shortly after, first period ending 2 to 0 for Chatham. Spratt for Chatham was going very strong and was very fast.

Second period opened fast and both teams working hard to score. Spratt who was always dangerous, shoved in another making it 3 to 0. Matthews one from right wing and McMahon got away again to a good start and notched another for Chatham. Spratt scored again just before close of period, which ended 5 to 1 in favor of Chatham. At one time in this period McMahon and Payne were in the penalty box, leaving Campbellton defence wide open and only Starrak, Thomas and Matthews on the ice putting up the fight of their lives.

The third period was all Campbellton and the boys tried hard to even the score. Pete McLean came an end to end rush and scored, and Matthews notched another after but it was too late to even matters, game ending 3 to 5 for Chatham.

Chatham has a strong team and play a good clean game with good combination.

It was bad for Campbellton when McLean and Payne were off at one time as the three forwards had to work extra hard.

Chatham was on their merits, are good stick handlers, fast skaters, and have in Spratt one of the very best. Matthews played a star game for Campbellton and Thomas and Starrak worked hard, Sharpe also played well, but it was all individual play and no combination. A man like Billy Hitchin, coach of the Victoria's when we won the Starr Trophy in 1913, is wanted, as our players here are second to none.

## DELEGATION MEETS PROV. GOVERNMENT

Fredericton, N. B. Feb. 9.—(Canadian Press.)—New Brunswick has been asked to contribute one quarter of the cost of a proposed inter-provincial bridge over the Restigouche River from Campbellton to Cross Point, Quebec.

What the structure will cost at the present time is not known as it is some time since surveys and estimates were made but the available figures show the probable cost to be not less than \$500,000, of which it is suggested that the federal government pay one half and the New Brunswick and Quebec governments one quarter each.

The proposition was placed before the provincial government here last night by Arthur T. LeBlanc, W. H. Miller and J. Harquail, of Campbellton and Pius Michaud, M. P., for Restigouche, Madawaska.

Premier Foster told the delegation that the government realized the importance of the proposed bridge and promised that the suggestion of the delegation would be given careful consideration.

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## EARTH OPENED AND SWALLOWED MANY

Missionary's Letter Describes Fearful Conditions After Earthquake.

Toronto, Feb. 8.—In a letter from G. W. Gibb, secretary of the mission in Shanghai, by A. E. Brownlee, secretary of the China inland mission, this city, it is stated that in the recent earthquake in China whole towns were swallowed; hills collapsed; big valleys opened up and hundreds of human beings engulfed; black water gushed from the ground, and whole caravans of camels disappeared in the earthquake openings. Mission property suffered, but so far as was known all the missionaries were safe.
