MUCH BUSINESS AT COUNCIL

Accumulation of Past Weeks Cleared Off—Summer Work Being Planned.

A meeting of the Town Council was held at the residence of His Worship Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding.

There were present Councillors St. Onge, Moore, Bell-Lisle, Graham, Marquis, Duncan, Gilber and Matthews. The minutes of several meetings were read and confirmed. The clerk read the following communication from the Board of Education: Secretary School Board asking for \$37,000 for school purpose.—Filed. Mrs. Morrison, Secretary Red Cross asking that a milk inspector be appointed to act on the Board.—On motion His Worship was appointed. A. A. Andrew, Sec. trustees Board Soldiers' Memorial Hospital asking that Council appoint a representative to act on the Board.—On motion His Worship was appointed. A number of applications for positions were placed on file until such positions were about to be filled. J. M. Keith, Clerk of Executive Council wrote re certified copies of acts passed, also enclosed account of \$3.00 for same.—Account ordered paid and letter filed. The City Engineer of Moncton in reference to the cost of street paving in that city. A considerable discussion took place on this paving question. Coun. Belle-lisle said that the Nairnville paving, according to the representative's figures would cost \$94,500 per mile. Farquhar would cost about \$25,000 per mile for a 35 foot street. Coun. Moore said that he understood that price of paving Water St. to the Subway, and Roseberry St. would be \$90,000. His Worship said that he understood that a thirty foot street could be put down for \$50,000 per mile. The company would also be a dollar per cubic yard for rock, crushed, but when spread on the street a cubic yard would cover five or six yards, and the company wanted to charge the town five or six dollars for the work of spreading and setting stone.—The letter was placed on file. The McLennan Foundry & Machine Works submitted a price of \$155.00 for boring necessary work in connection thereto.—Referred to the Electric Light Committee. The Department of Lands and Mines wrote as follows:—

Express Will Run From Campbellton to Edmunston Three Days Each Week.

Effective Monday, May 1st, train No. 37 will run between Campbellton and Edmunston, leaving Campbellton at 7:30 am., on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, arriving St. Leonard at 12:35 noon, and reaching Edmunston at 1:30 pm.

Train No. 38 will leave Edmunston at 12:30 p.m., on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, arriving at St. Leonard 1:25 pm., leaving St. Leonard at 1:50 pm., and reaching Campbellton at 6:25 pm. This was placed on file. Joseph Allard wrote in reference to his application for a loan under the Housing Act. Referred to the Housing Board. H. G. V. Farrer wrote in reference to attending the annual convention of Electric Engineers. Referred to Electric Light Committee with power to act.

A number of applications for licenses were referred to the Police and License Committee. These applications brought out a discussion on the general over-charge in taxi fares. Coun. Duncan thought non-residents should pay more than our own taxpayers. Clerk—They now pay double license fees. Coun. St. Onge said that most peddlers paid only \$20.00 and they competed with our regular meat markets. Should be taxed more. Coun. Gilber asked the establishment of a market would remedy this. The various departmental accounts were ordered paid.

During the passing of these accounts some instances of over-charges were pointed out and the whole system of buying was condemned.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported as follows:— That in the case of George Hachey a reduction of \$500 on personal property be made, he having been assessed at an auto which he did not own. That in the case of Emil Roy, his property valuation be reduced \$300. That in the case of Alex. Mowat, no reduction be made. That in the case of Mrs. Elsie Robertson, a reduction of \$400 be made in her taxes. This report was received and adopted. The Police and License Committee reported recommending that the Durick Drug Store be given a permit to sell upon payment of \$15.00.—Report adopted. The matter of the request of J. E. Dion for more pay was again taken up.

His Worship explained that Dion had been engaged as foreman at the stone quarry at 35 cents per hour. He had accepted at this rate, but after the work was finished he wrote asking for 45 cents per hour. Coun. Moore moved that the request be not entertained. Coun. Belle-lisle said that when Dion was hired it was only to superintend the work, but as the work progressed he had to handle dynamite. Coun. Belle-lisle moved in amendment that Dion be granted 40 cents per hour. The amendment was lost and original motion carried. The matter of the appointment of the Town Engineer was taken up and considerable discussion thereon. Coun. Duncan moved that the present engineer be appointed and instructed to prepare plans for summer's work.—Not seconded. The motion carried. Coun. Duncan said that it was advisable to have a full expression of the ratepayers in the vote to be taken May 4th and he thought that an advance poll should be held so that ratepayers and commercial travellers away on that date could cast their ballots. Coun. Duncan moved that the necessary resolution for such a poll which will be held at W. T. Cook's store on Saturday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday preceding the date of holding the said vote. Motion Carried.
