"The railway is already a short distance west of there (Regina), and the way in which it is being pushed on towards the Rockies speaks well for those who have it in charge. Four miles a day is the average progress, but this is often exceeded. An army of 8,500 men and 2,600 teams are at work on this part of the line, and while I was talking to Mr. Shapherd, one of the contractors, the track-layers generated, and two hours later the rails were liaid for a mile beyond. So the werk progresses without even a hitch. At every station along where the line is being constructed there is a detachment of mounted police for the purpose of keeping order and the fire water from the men.
