PIONEER RESIDENT OF

CARADOC TP. DIES

STRATHROY, Sept. 1.—The death

CORN BAN ON MANY

ONTARIO TOWNSHIPS

Embargo is Extended to Parts of Nor-

folk and Hamilton.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—(Canadian Press

Dispatch).—As a result of the scouring

work for the European corn borer car-

ried on by the Dominion department of

agriculture, it has been found that this

insect has spread into new territory this

year. On account of the danger of

carrying the pest into uninfested dis-

tricts a ministerial order has been pas-

sed prohibiting the removal of corn, in-

cluding sweet corn and seed corn, from

the cob, corn stalks, etc., from the fol-

lowing townships in Ontario: Charlotte-

ville, Houghton, Middleton, Townsend,

Walsingham North, Walsingham South,

Windham, Woodhouse, in the County of

Norfolk, Cayuga North, Dunn, Rain-

ham and Walpole in the County of Hal-

damand, and Ebeleigh and Romney in

the County of Kent.

The order is supplementary to the

May 15, 1921.
