

Food Board Forbids Candy, Icing, Pastry

Ottawa, April 29. — Following the announcement by the Canada Food Board that no manufacturers in Canada will be permitted to use for the manufacture of candy more than 50 per cent. of the average monthly quantity of cane sugar, and that drastic restrictions have been imposed on the use of wheat flour, sugar and shortening in the manufacture of biscuits, cakes or sweet dough prosugar and shortening in the manufacture of biscuits, cakes or sweet dough products, the food board issued an order that no persons shall make in Canada, for private consumption, French pastries, iced cakes or biscuits, or cakes with icing of cane sugar between the layers, or added to the exterior; and no person shall use in Canada cane sugar for making for private consumption what is commonly called "candy."
