LAMBTON SCHOOL FAIRS


Arrangements have been complet-ed by W. P. Macdonald, district re-presentative of the Ontario depart-ment of agriculture, for the staging of the annual rural school fairs of Lambton county.

The programs that have been drawn up for this year's fairs are practically replicas of the ones which have featured the fairs of past years. Included are live stock, live stock naming, public speaking and sports contests. Of course, the con-tests mentioned in the foregoing are ones in which boys will compete exclusively. For the girls there will be cooking, sewing and drawing competitions, also sports. The roots, grains, vegetables and other produce which the boys will ex-hibit have been grown from seeds supplied and certified by the Ontario department of agriculture. 
poultry class the birds exhibited must have been reared from eggs

supplied by the same department. According to Mr. Macdonald the fall school fairs of this year will excite more interest and produce more entries than any previous year since he assumed office. 

Their Streets Heaped With Dead San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 2.

Tokio, Yokohama and neighboring cities to-night were burning ruins. while more than 200,000 persons in

the vicinity of these cities were re-ported dead as a result of Saturday's earthquakes, according to advices re-ceived here by the Associated Press from its Shanghai correspondent and by the radio correspondent from its station at Tomioka.

Death and destruction were spread over an area roughly comprised with-

in a radius of fifty miles of Tokio. All sources of news confirm the "Send me telegrams and send them collect," said Mayor Rolph, speaking into the microphone as he opened a new radio broadcasting appalling extent of the disaster in Japan from earthquake, fire and tidal opened at New Tado broadcasting station at San Francisco. 'Come on, everybody. I want to find out how far my voice is carrying." He found out. By the next day the telegraph tolls had exceeded \$3,000. By now he may wish that he hadn't spoken so loud. flood. The Japanese Minister of Mar-ine estimates that the fatalities in Tokio alone will number 150,000. 
