On the 1st inst., on motion of Mr. Boyd, the

a Bill to provide for the more effectually re-
pairing the roads and bridges in the Parish
of Grand Manan, which was agreed to with
amendments.

REPEAL OF THE BANKRUPT LAW.—The
Legislative Council, on the 25th, February
passed a bill brought in by the Hon. Mr.
Crane, for the repeal of the Bankrupt Law.

FIRE AT CALAIS.—We learn that the "Uni-
on Mills" at Calais, were destroyed by fire on
Saturday morning last about 4 o'clock, to-
gether with a large quantity of lumber and
shingles. Such was the rapidity with which
the fire spread, that in less than an hour from
the first alarm, three double saw mills, six
lath machines, several single machines, with
lumber &c., were destroyed. The property
was owned by Messrs J. S. Hall, B. F. Waite,
and R. Whidden. Our informant says that it
was supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

A large public meeting was held at
Woodstock, on the 19th February, to take
into consideration the propriety of addressing
a memorial to the Legislature, upon the
great importance of opening an inland naviga-
tion with Canada. Several spirited resolu-
tions were passed, and a memorial, predicated
upon them, addressed to the Lieut. Governor
and both branches of the Legislature. The
editor of the Woodstock Sentinel in his re-
marks upon the subject very justly observes:

"If the undertaking be practicable, it cer-
tainly is one of the most serious importance
to the Province at large and to this County
in particular; for under the present threefold
pressure, occasioned by the failure of potatoes,
wheat and lumber, there are few places on
the face of the earth which have had more to
contend with than this."

Intimately connected with this subject is the
Saint Andrews Railway, as the transportation
of produce or merchandise on either, makes
the other necessary to carry out the plan in a
proper manner. It is the imperative duty, as
well as the privilege, of those who have an
interest in the welfare of the colonies to give
every subject of this nature the most mature
consideration."

We observe in the same paper that a re-
quisition had been sent the Sheriff, to call a
public meeting, "to take into consideration
matters connected with the Saint Andrews
and Woodstock Railway," which was ad-
vertised to take place on Wednesday last, the
25th February.

The sum of £20,000 has been voted
for Roads and Bridges in Nova Scotia for the
present year.

IN A MESS.—The Committee on Public
Accounts reported on Wednesday last, an ex-
hibited a truly frightful picture of the state of
the Province, which much more than realized
the very worst fears entertained by Conserva-
tives, and showed a deficiency of some £37,-
000. If the Radicals go on at this rate, by
the time their four years are up, we shall
have the Province in debt upwards of £148,-
000!!! So much for a self-styled Liberal
Government and Liberal Legislature. And yet,
knowing these facts, the Government
had the effrontery to oppose the motion of
Mr. Johnston—that £1,000 instead of £1,-
200 be given to the new Financial Officers—
for doing the same amount of work which,
under the late Conservative administration,
was performed for £500! Verily the Govern-
ment count largely on the forbearance of a
deeply wronged and suffering people.—*Hali-
fax Colonist.*

A BILL.

To provide for the more effectually repairing
the Roads and Bridges on the Island of
Campo Bello, in the County of Charlotte.
WHEREAS the scattered state of the po-
pulation on the Island of Campo Bello,
renders the present High Way Act, al-
most inoperative; for remedy thereof:
"I.—Be it enacted by the Lieutenant
Governor, Legislative Council and Assem-
bly, That all persons liable to perform—stat-
ute labour on the roads and bridges in the
Parish of Campo Bello, in the County of
Charlotte, shall in future pay the sum of one
shilling and six pence, for each and every
pay's labour such persons are respectively
liable to perform.

"II.—And be it enacted. That the monies
required to be paid by virtue of this Act,
shall be assessed, levied and collected, in
the same manner as any Parish or County
rates are assessed levied and collected, by
virtue of any law now in force, or hereafter
to be in force for that purpose in this Pro-
vince; and such monies when collected
shall be paid over to the Commissioner of
Highways to be appointed for that purpose
in the same manner, and by the same au-
thority, as Commissioner of Highways are
now appointed, to be by them expended
publicly in their respective districts on the
Highways and Bridges in said districts.

"III.—And be it enacted. That this Act
shall continue and be in force until the first
day of April which will be in the year of our
Lord thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.
