### GIRLS' WORK BOARD NOTES

A few years ago, while we watched with interest the beginning and development of the Tuxis Movement for boys, our regret was that there was not a similar work for the benefit of our girls.

To-day, under the direction of the Maritime Religious Education Council, work is being carried on for boys and girls alike; and the C.G.I.T. girls are holding their own with the Tuxis boys.

C.G.I.T. groups are to be found in many places in the Maritime Provinces—with a Girls' Work Secretary, Miss Mary R. Allison, moving from place, organizing, directing, attending conferences, and carrying with her inspiration for girls and leaders alike.

Here and there also we hear of "Girls' Work Boards" being organized. There are at present five of these in New Brunswick, one in Prince Edward Island, while the first in Nova Scotia is the one which was organized in Bridgetown about two months ago.

As noted in last week's MONITOR, we are looking forward to a visit from Miss Allison on March 21st and 22nd, and again a week later.

On her first visit, Miss Allison wishes to meet the leaders of the C. G. I. T. groups, and all others especially interested in girls' work. She proposes for these a short Training Course, which will give new suggestions for work, and strengthen the old ideals.

For all wishing to avail themselves of this Training Course, there will be a registration fee of twenty-five cents. Also, enrollment cards will be drawn up for the signature of any such. Any woman in the three congregations, interested in girls' work, will be entitled to this course, with the members of the Board, on the signing of an enrollment card, and paying the registration fee.

It is expected that on these two days the following program will be carried out:—

Tuesday, March 21st, in the school room of the United German Providence Church, a meeting of the Girls' Work Board. Directly following this will be the Training Course series.

Tuesday afternoon—3.30—5.30.

Tuesday evening—7.30—9.30.

On Wednesday afternoon, in the school room of the Baptist Church—2.30—5.30.

On the return visit of Miss Allison there will be a Rally Service of all C.G.I.T. girls with their mothers. It is hoped that this service will be on Sunday, April 2nd. The date will be announced definitely later.

Another matter under the direction of the Girls' Work Board is the visit of Miss Alice M. Harrison, Elementary Secretary of the M. R. E. C., on Friday, March 31st. Miss Harrison's special work while here, is with the teachers of all the Sunday Schools of Bridgetown district, who are with the children up to twelve years of age. A fuller program of this visit will be given next week.

### ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The annual meeting of the School Board of town of Bridgetown was held last week.

J. E. Lloyd, Clerk of the Board, occupied the chair and announced the following as composing the new School Board:

Representing the Town Council, Mayor Warren, H. B. Hicks, W. E. Gesner.

Government Appointees: Rev. Dr. Jost, M. E. Armstrong, M. D.

On motion Dr. Armstrong was re-elected chairman. Estimates for the coming year were considered and on motion the same amount was voted as the previous year, viz., \$7,500, this amount to provide for teachers salaries as last year and running expenses, interest on building funds, sinking fund, insurance, etc.

It was decided to again allow Grades 8, 9, 10, and 11 from the Carleton Corner school to attend for the same sum as last year and that tuition fee for other children from outside sections remain the same.

A meeting of those interested in providing a rink for Bridgetown was held in the Board of Trade rooms Thursday evening when the report of the canvassing committee was heard and it was noted that about \$3,000.00 is still to be subscribed before it will be possible to go ahead with the undertaking. It is thought that if everybody could be made to realize what a great benefit a rink would be to Bridgetown that the money would be easily forthcoming. When it is taken into consideration that Bridgetown has no means of recreation during the winter months and that our young people are obliged to go to neighboring towns to enjoy a game of hockey or to have a skate it would seem that a rink is almost a necessity for our town. Can not an appeal be made to the "home town pride" of our citizens and raise this amount of \$3,000.00 before the 21st inst., when the matter will be finally settled?

### NORWEGIAN STEAMER DOCKS AT ST. JOHN'S

St. John's, Nfld., March 8—An ice-weary crew greeted the sight of land with enthusiasm when the Norwegian steamer Sisto arrived here to-day. The Sisto left Cardiff January 28th, with a cargo of coal for this port. Since the middle of February she had been prevented from coming in by the heavy ice field off the Newfoundland coast. Provisions were nearly exhausted.

Offshore winds loosened the ice to-day and the Sisto poked her way up to her dock through the floes. The Danish steamer Bornholm, which left Halifax February 20th, and had been held up by the ice since February 27th, also arrived to-day.

Parrsboro, March 8—The term schr. Peaceland, Capt. W. E. Wasson, which sailed from Boston on Monday, February 26th, arrived here on Saturday with a cargo of fertilizer, bound for Windsor. Capt. Wasson is to be congratulated upon making a successful passage into port through the drift ice without the aid of a tug.
