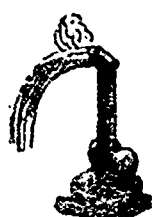

Scientific and Useful.

A SMALL quantity of sassafras bark placed
among any kind of dried fruit or dried beans
will keep it free from worms or bugs for years.

FRIED RICE.—Rice boiled in milk and
water with a little salt; mould in a square
pan and when cold cut into small squares;
dip in egg and cracker dust and fry a light
brown.

A PIECE of soft newspaper and a little
alcohol will clean windows and mirrors quick-
ly, and give a nice polish. Paper is better
for the purpose, as the lint from a cloth is not
easily removed.

PROLONGED freshness is secured by pla-
g flowers in water for some hours before they
are sent away. It is the greatest fallacy to
suppose that any which have to be sent to a
distance should be fresh picked. They will
travel better and last longer if allowed to
imbibe a full supply of moisture before start-
ing.

FRIED BREAD.—A dish much liked for
breakfast is fried bread. This may be made
by beating three eggs with a teaspoonful of
salt; have ready a skillet of hot lard or
dripping; dip some slices of bread in cold
water, then in the egg, and fry on both
sides a very light brown; season with pep-
per. Of course you can use more if your
family is large, but this will be sufficient for
three or four persons.

PRINCESS PUDDING.—Soak for an hour
in a pint of cold water one box of Cox's gela-
tine, and add one pint of boiling water, one
pint of wine, the juice of four lemons and
three large cupsful of sugar. Beat the
whites of four eggs to a stiff froth, and stir
into a jelly when it begins to thicken. Pour
into a large mould and set in a cool place or
ice water. When ready to serve, turn out
as you would jelly, only have the pudding in
a deep dish. Pour one quart of boiled custard
around it and serve.
