

KING'S COLLEGE EXERCISES.—The Annual Sermon before the University was preached in the Cathedral on Sunday, June 26, by the Venerable the Archdeacon.

On Tuesday, June 28, the Examination for Degrees was held, the Rev. Messrs. Coster and Ketchum being Examiners.

On Thursday, June 30, the Public Academical Act was held in full Convocation, the Chief Justice presiding as Chancellor. The Commemorative Oration was delivered by professor Jack. Mr. H. J. MLardy read his Essay on "Mahomet; his career, and its results," and received from the hands of the Chancellor, the two volumes, of Foster's "Mahometism Unveiled," which had been awarded him in testimony of the merits of his composition.

On Wednesday, July 6, being the last day of Trinity Term, and of the Academical year, the Annual Examination was held, the Lord Bishop of Fredericton presiding on the occasion.

Michaelmas Term and the Academical Year commences on Thursday, September 1; when all Students intending to keep the Term are required to attend Divine Service in the College Chapel at 11 A. M.

Atlantic and St. Lawrence Railroad.—The Atlantic and St. Lawrence and the St. Lawrence and Atlantic railroads have been connected at Island Pond, and cars are to run through from Portland by this route to Montreal on Monday next. Two trains will run over this road daily, one of which, leaving Portland at a quarter past seven o'clock in the morning, will reach Montreal the same evening; the other will leave at a quarter past one, and stop over night at Sherbrooke, arriving at Montreal next forenoon at half-past ten o'clock.—St. John N. B. Courier.

The London Times says: "In 50 years Ireland will be Protestant to a man. Both the Roman Catholics of Ireland, and the race identified with that faith, are all leaving Ireland. Ere long there will be none left. At the present rate of emigration, which cannot be much less than 200,000, chiefly Roman Catholics in a year, our children will see the time when the Celts will be as obsolete in Ireland as the Phoenicians in Cornwall." The Times omits a very important feature in the case—the thousands that are being added to the true Catholic Church in Ireland.

JUAN FERNANDEZ.—On the famous Island of Juan Fernandez there is a thriving colony of 300 persons. Two years ago there were no inhabitants on it.

The Monitor contains a decree, making several columns of type, regulating affairs of the Bonaparte family. The Emperor makes himself sole master of the family. His consent is necessary to the marriage or divorce of any Bonaparte. No Bonaparte must go further than 15 leagues from home without permission, else the Emperor is to punish them by arrest or exile. Monsignor Garibaldi, the Pope's Nuncio, was buried with great pomp—all the foreign ministers assisted.

Java papers say that the celebrated lady traveller, Madame Ida Pfeiffer, had left Amboyna and the island of Saparoea, accompanied by ten natives, with whom she proceeded to Makarki, and thence by foot through Ceram.

Three months ago three Mormons only were known at Malmo, in Sweden. These three have made so many proselytes that there are now 80, which is not to be wondered at, as their preachers pay fourteen Swedish dollars to each convert baptized.

CITIES AND COUNTRY.—The total population of the villages, towns and cities of the United States, is only 4,000,000, while the rural population, "the honest peasantry, their country's pride," is 19,263,000. The four cities of New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Baltimore contain a population of 1,214,000, the amount of whose real and personal property is \$702,000, 100 or \$578 each. The property of the rural population is \$2,312,000,000 or about \$120 each.

We are sorry to announce that Miss C., the young lady in Surrey-place, who was reported in this Journal some few weeks ago to have suffered from trying the table moving experiment, by means of magnetic agency, is much worse. Hopes were entertained that she would soon recover the use of her hands. It seems, however, that those hopes have not been realized. Her hands are now firmly clenched together, and it requires great force to separate the fingers, even for a moment, from the palms of her hands. This extraordinary affair has caused intense excitement in the medical profession.—London paper.

The Gavazzi inquest closed at Montreal on the 12th ult., nine Protestant jurors found that the firing was by the Mayor's orders, and unnecessary and unjustifiable. Ten Roman Catholic jurors, found that the order was given by some person unknown.
