It is said to have been decided at Windsor, on the recent visit to London, that the Emperor Napoleon was to take the supreme command of the allied forces in the Crimea. This would take the responsibility of raising the siege, if necessary, off the allied generals. The Emperor starts immediately for the seat of war.
