1 MINISTER LALONDE: I don't think it has affected 2 immigration into Canada. Immigration in Canada has been 3 affected, mainly because of the general economic condition; 4 and the question should be whether the economic condition 5 has been affected by the political situation -- to which 6 I would say, "Yes". "It has been, somewhat." It is hard to put a figure on it but it has not been an indifferent factor. 7 I would say ... in terms of direct impact on immigra-8 tion __ "No". It is related to the general economic situation. 9 People are going to migrate to Canada if they find they 10 can have a job, and a ready job. We are going to admit them 11 12 if there is a job available. 13 MEMBER OF THE PRESS. Do you have less French-speaking people coming to Canada, and more other people, since there 14 15 is this kind of struggle?

MINISTER LALONDE: I could not tell you that there has been any appreciable difference, one way or another. This has not changed the balance of immigration in any appreciable way. No.

MEMBER OF THE PRESS: Sir, in light of the strong economic relations between Canada and the U.S., the National question of Quebec is, obviously, a question for the United States Government, too.
