### TWENTY MILLION **MUMMIES FOUND**

Thousand of the Best Preserved Are Now in Museums of the World:

Christian Herald. It has been estimated that something like 20,000,000 Egyptian muramies have been discovered. Thousands of those cases of the various museums of the world. In the tombs with the mummies were countless other objects. There were paintings on the walls, chairs and tables, jars containing the parts of the body which were removed when the mummy was prepared, mummy cases guadily colored with funeral seconds and histographic inscriptions. my cases guadily colored with funeral scenes and hieroglyphic inscriptions, and in the cases along with the mummies were papyri. Beneath each mummy's head, like a cushion, was a little disc of clay or papyrus, covered with mythological pictures and with a stereotyped hymn. The discs, found in stereotyped hymn. The discs, found in great numbers, are nearly alike, varying only slightly with the period from which they came. "Hypocephali" they are called, because they were placed beneath the head. Like the nummies, the objects found with them have been scattered abroad, and in the museum at Cairo any tourist may purchase as many of them as he will.

The inscription on the discs and the mummy cases, of course, could not the mummy cases, of course, could not at first be read, nor could the mythological pictures accompanying them be understood until the inscriptions could be read. However, in 1799 the famous Rosetta Stone was discovered, and Champollion, a French scholar, began the slow process of deciphering its hieroglyphic inscription with the aid of the accompanying Greek translation. the accompanying Greek translation. not until 1841 that a grammar of the Egyptian language appeared. Then the process in the study of the language was rapid: the strange hiero-glypics became as intelligible as an English newspaper.
