SPURIOUS HONEY SOLD. One vendor said he sold it not as honey, but as honeymoon syrup. ## PUBLIC LIBRARIANS

Dr. George H. Locke Tells How Library is Becoming More Instructive.

LOCATING THE DEMAND

Reading Public Asked to Be More Confiding—Toronto Institute Meets.

There is under contemplation by the guaranteed. Toronto Public Library management a movement of greater significance to the reading public than has been planned to date for any Canadian city. A social survey of the entire popula-tion will be taken with the different branches of the city library serving as special agencies. The actual nature of the undertaking combines the education of different classes of people by catering to their special needs and encouraging certain inclinations in their character by providing them with congenial material. This idea, which is now being advanced by Dr. George H. Locke, chief librarian, will be worked out by means of the librarians in the different centres. They will study the patrons within a radius of miles and serve their reading wants accord-

"The mistake is often made of thinking that the older man want technical books only," declared Dr. Locke, in the course of his address at the second annual meeting of the Toronto Library Institute last evening. What he wants are recreational books. The man we like to see is the man with a hobby or an interest but let hi mtell us what it is. We should not have to extract from him the natuhe of the books he wants. People do not often enough take the librarian into confidence as to the class of books they

specially desire." Reference was made to the relationship existing between the public lib-rary and the schools. A great fault was often found in the debating exercises carried on. Subjects as a rule lacked definiteness and were too com-prehensive. They trained students in dialectics rather than in knowledge.

Toronto astromomers are taking Toronto astromomers are taking a keen interest in the transit of Mercury which takes place this Saturday morning from 4.58 to 9.10 o'clock. With a clear sky the planet will be observable creeping across the lower part of the sun's face. Shortly after 7 o'clock, Mercury in transit appears like a black spot in the sun. This morning Mercury will pass directly between the earth and the sun.

#### APPLE RECIPES

The apple is without question the king of fruits. Whether fresh, dried, evaporated or canned, the apple is a wholeson food, easily prepared, attractive and palatable at all times. Because of its rare keeping qualities people in the most remote parts are able to take advantage of its great food value. Apples vary in flavor and texture. They are often marketed before they are mature, and the cooking and keeping qualities are thus injured. None of the soft, insipid apples are suitable for preserving; the sound, tart apples are the best for this purpose. In the fall and early winter, apples are at their best, and spices need not be added, because their flavor cannot be improved, but toward spring the flavor becomes somewhat flat and is improved by the addition of spices or other flavorings. Always cook apples in earthen or granite ware utensils and use silver, granite or wooden spoons for stirring. The use of the apple as a basis for practically all manufactured jellies and jams is well known. This is due to the large amount of pectose which it contains. There is no waste to a good apple. Even the paring and core may be utilized for jelly. Fruits are classified as flavor fruits and nutritive fruits. The apples comes under both of these heads. Average composition of the apples food, easily prepared, attractive and palaapples comes under both of these heads.
Average composition of the apple:
Water, 82:5; carbohydrates, 12:5; proteid Water, 82.5; carbohydrates, 12.5; proteid, 4; nitrogenous, 4; fats, 5; acide, 1.0; cellulose, 2.7 per cent. From a dietic standpoint, the most important function of the apple is that of furnishing mineral salts and organic acids, but it has an important nutritive value as well furnished by the carbohydrates present. As the fruit ripens the starch changes to sugar. The apple has a medicinal value as well, especially if eaten at the beginning of the meal or between meals.

Varieties good for cooking: Duchess, King, Astrachan, Rhode Island, Greening, Alexander, Baldwin, Gravenstein, Blenheim, Golden Russet, Spy, Ribston, St. Lawrence, Wealthy.

Good dessert apples: Wealthy, Fameuse, McIntosh Red, Spy, King.

Good cider apples: Baldwin, Golden Russet, Gravenstein.

Afterthought.

One pint of nice apple sauce sweetened to taste; stir in the yolk of two eggs, well beaten. Bake for fitteen minutes. Cover with a meringue made of two well-beaten whites and one-half cup of powdered sugar. Return to the oven and brown.

Prepare a mixture of grape-fruit pulp, pineapple and banana, and put into glasses; add a few of the apple balls, pour over all the juice left from the fruit which has been boiled down with sugar; cool and serve at once, or the apples may turn brown.

Prepare the apple balls as before; prepare a rich sugar syrup; color with a little pink color paste, and drop in the balls; cook slowly until the balls are softened; pile in glasses and add a little
