

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any mail over eighteen years old, may homestead a quartar-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Ailand in Manitoba, Saskatchewen of a berta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (out not Sur-Agency) on certa.n Duties-Six months' residence upon and

cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of nis homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a lomesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price

section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also fifty acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his home stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fift; acres, and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substi-tuted for cultivation under certain con-

ditions.
