DAN GILMOUR REFEREEES OTTAWA-VARSITY GAME

White Savage of McGill University
Will Be Umpire—Greatest
Game of the Year.

Dan Gilmour, vice-president of the Intercollegiate Rugby Union, will referee the game between Varsity and Ottawa College this afternoon and his umpire will be Savage of McGill University. This is not the first time that Gilmour has refereed a game of this nature.

Everything is now ready for the big game at Varsity stadium between the Toronto University team and Ottawa College for the championship of the Intercollegiate Union and the honor of playing the first game for the Canadian Rugby Union.

The game will start promptly at 2:30 and both teams are expected to play the highest pitch and are confident of victory.

Varsity's team will be the same as announced several times this week with Bob Thompson and Jeff Taylor playing middle wings.

Argonauts seem well satisfied with the appointment of officials for the game at Ottawa, and left by C.P.R. at 10 o'clock last night.

Instead of resting on their oars for a week, as they have announced, the Argonauts will play a league game with the High Park team on Varsity campus this afternoon at 3 o'clock and they will have to row hard if they wish to get the big end of the score. The last time these teams met, the Argonauts won by a score of 2 to 0, but now the west enders are considerably stronger and are very confident of turning the tables. A win for the Argonauts means almost a certain three-pointed star, with a great chance of being the first team to win the championship of the Intercollegiate Union.

Porters are asked to be on hand to observe the boys on their way to the field. The Argonauts are requested to meet at Bellwoods Park on Saturday at 2 o'clock and go to the grounds in a body.

The Capital-Tiger II. game will be played at Rosedale at 2 o'clock. All players are requested to be out early.

The Montreal Gazette says that the whole Montreal team is taking the Tiger game very much in earnest. The last game they played was a very close one, with thirty players, none of whom were things easily. All worked as the championship of the Intercollegiate Union and the honor of playing the first game for the Canadian Rugby Union.

Savage is bracketed with Ryan of Ottawa as the best outside wing in the Big Four, and Cameron on the other end of the line to aid him, he will give the Tiger backs little chance to get away. Argonauts are taking down about a hundred supporters with them to cheer them along.

Hamilton Herald: The Tigers left for Montreal, where they will play their last scheduled game of the Intercollegiate series. The players are all in the best of health, and the exception of Oliver, and it is not likely he will be used. Gibson will play centre-half, with McNeill and McKinnon as his main backs.

In the last half Ben Simpson, Art Moore and George Ballard will play, and the Argonauts have three strong three-cornered ties, and they should be needed in some of the games later on. The Tigers expect a hard game, and are well prepared to step the limit. Hugh Hays accompanied the team and will be one of the officials, along with a Montreal man. The Tigers should win, also the Argonauts have Ottawa last night, and the Senators fail to down the Argos, the Argonauts have the championship clinched, and Tigers have their suits for another year. Ottawa will win if the team plays as it did against Tigers at Ottawa, and then will come the play-off.

An Ottawa despatch says the probable line-up for the Ottawa team in today's game with the Argos is as follows: Full, Johnstone; left, Robertson; centre, Gerrard; right, McCann; quarter, Snelling; scrumming, Black, Phillips and Wilkinson; outside, Ryan, Galtford; middle, McDougall, Elliott; inside, Stewart, Vaughan, Jack Williams will be held in reserve and will take Gerrard's place if the line knee gives out. The Ottawa players are confident and there is plenty of Rough Rider money, but no Argos money has as yet put in an appearance. Babe Reynolds will referee the game.

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American Turfmen Are Welcomed in England

Interest in Racing Stables of Whitney, Keene, Belmont and Hildreth—Praise for American Training and Riding Methods.

With the arrival of Harry Payne Whitney's yearlings at his English racing establishment last week, the hot Indian some of those recently sold to him by James R. Keene, and the prospective departure of the horses of S. C. Hildreth says he sold to Charles Kohler to be raced in England next year. Interest in American turfmen on the other side of the Atlantic naturally increases.

Whitney will have more than seventy horses in training under the care of Jack Joyner next season, while the stables of Mr. Keene and Hildreth will be increased too. The Hildreth-Kohler horses to be ridden by Jockey Shilling are awaited eagerly in Great Britain for turfmen's anxious to see what the famous Flat-Harrier and Novelty look like when under saddle. With W. S. Vanderbilt, Frank Gould, H. B. Duray and other prominent Americans racing, as usual, in France next year, it is believed that American bred horses will gain more distinction on the English and French racecourses than ever before. One of the London turf papers printed the following recently, which shows American progress in British racing:

"When the English turf season's record is compiled for 1911 it will be found that American owned and American bred horses have fared better this year than ever before. With almost each succeeding day the amount to the credit of the American owners is increased, while not infrequently, as was the case at Newmarket on Cambridge day, American bred horses finish in front in two of the races on the day's card."

"In the Nursery Plate, an event worth \$500 to the winner, J. R. Keene's Outram was first, while the familiar colors of Harry Payne Whitney flashed past the post in second place. Later in the afternoon Mr. Whitney's Bahari ran a dead heat with Marquis, the purple being divided. A few days ago, the afternoon that the Duke of York Stakes was run off, August Belmont's Torgny won the Kempton Park Nursery, worth \$4000, while in another race the American bred filly Meddler won a good two-year-old race."

"It must be admitted that in the big races of the season in which American horses were entered there were more failures than successes, but the number of fairly important races that have gone to the credit of Americans has occasioned no little comment all along the line. Nearly all of the prominent American owners who have racing stables here have been in England for a part of the season at least, but just at present it happens that all of them are in the States."
