STEAMER GETS CERTIFICATE.

Outside Inspectors Brought in After Local Man Refuses.

Kingston, Aug. 13.—A certificate has been granted the steamer New York of the Thousand Island Steamboat Co., and international unpleasances have been averted. Inspector Davis of Kingston refused to certify on the ground that the hull required to be strengthened. Mr. Folger, manager of the company, charges that Mr. Davis' action was due to incompetency or was instigated by personal motives and prejudices. The steamer had passed by Inspector Dullos of Montreal, who examined the hull in company with Edward Adams of Ottawa, chairman of the Canadian board of steamboat inspectors.

CURE FOR LEPROSY.

Of 25 Cases Treated, Six Are Absolutely Cured.

Manila, Aug. 12.—American surgeons connected with the board of health of Manila declare that they have discovered a positive cure for leprosy. Of twenty-five cases treated, all have improved, six cases being absolutely cured. Several patients, portions of whose bodies were gone, have recovered. All of the cases have been under observation for at least six months, and it is absolutely impossible to discover a trace of germs of the disease in the blood of the patients. The method used is a system of x-rays.

BIG POOLROOM RAID.

New York, Aug. 12.—What is said to be the biggest pool room raid ever made in this city took place today, when the police broke into an upper floor of a factory building in Marlon-street and arrested 500 men. Five men, who were charged with running the place, were held, and the rest were permitted to go, after their names had been taken.

BOMB THROWN IN STREETS.

Bellotown, Russia, Aug. 12.—A bomb was thrown in Sourskaya-street today, several persons being killed.

LOST IN THE WOODS.

Wheatley, Aug. 12.—About 10 o'clock last night Roland Lamarch, youngest son of James Lamarch, was seized with a fit of insanity. He was in the house at the time and jumping thru the window, he started across the fields along the banks of two creeks. His uncle, O. Lamarch, was able to keep him in sight for some time, but he eventually struck off into a piece of woodland, and Mr. Lamarch lost sight of him. Search was continued far into the night, but he has not been seen in vain.

ENGINEERS FOR CAMP.

Kingston, Aug. 12.—The Royal Canadian Engineers, under Lieut. Lindsay, left to-night by Grand Trunk Railway for Levis for camp and field duty, and thirty men of the Royal Canadian Artillery will leave for Peterborough to-day.

VENEZUELA'S ESTIMATES.

Caracas, Venezuela, Aug. 12.—Congress to-day voted estimates to the amount of 50,000,000 bolivars, the largest ever granted. The estimates included 12,000,000 bolivars for the army, 12,000,000 bolivars for the navy, and 4,000,000 bolivars for public works.

Cape Town, Aug. 12.—The Cape University will confer 14 honorary degrees on the occasion of the visit of the British Association. The proposed recipients include representatives of the United States and Canada.

AGRIAN TROUBLES INCREASE.

Madrid, Aug. 12.—Telegrams received here from Seville, Malaga and Cordova reports that the agrarian troubles are becoming increasingly serious. At the request of financial houses here, Senor Urquiza, minister of finance, has decided to close the bourse next Monday.

KISER DASHES TO FENCE

LOSES LEG, MAY LOSE LIFE

Lost Control of Car While Preparing

to Start in Race at Cleveland.

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 12.—Going at the rate of a mile a minute in view of 5000 persons, Earl Kiser, driving the Winton Buick, dashed into the fence at the Cleveland Driving Park this afternoon and was so badly injured that his left leg had to be amputated at the knee. His right shoulder was dislocated and he was otherwise injured.

The accident occurred at the quarter pole, while Kiser was trying out his machine before the race. He was endeavoring to pocket a car that was following him, when suddenly he lost control of the machine. It seemed to jump four feet in the air and then came down with a crash against the fence.

A section of fence 30 feet in length was smashed and the machine, turning completely over, came down upon Kiser. Instantly there was a crash, and Kiser was thrown from the machine.

Soon Dr. Lavigne arrived, Kiser, who was bleeding from the head, was taken to the hospital. He was in a very bad condition and it is feared he will die.

The injured man became prominent as a driver of racing cars last year, and in the old bicycle days he was a noted speed merchant.

Kiser, the racing man could hardly be expected to drive with his arm and leg disabled. He had been driving his own way and won every race he started. The track and warner were ideal and the crowd large.
