

BLOOR STREET WILL BE PAVED.

Works Committee Decides to End Long Delay in the Matter.

The civic works committee wrestled long yesterday with the Preston-ave. widening problem. Ex-Ald. J. R. L. Starr, who led a deputation of protesters at Monday's council meeting, brought up the same argument, and N. B. Cash for Saunders and Company, who have erected factory buildings at a cost claimed of \$20,000, on the alleged understanding that the thoroughfare from Northumberland to Hallam st. would be widened 22 feet argued again that the extension go thru. Mr. Forman said the widening was a necessary improvement, and denied that any injustice would be done to east side residents if they were taxed for the land to be taken over. It developed that a petition for the widening had been signed by 76 residents, while a counter petition had only 24. However, Controller Hubbard and others of the committee thought the land company should be willing to deduct the strip required, and the matter was passed on to the controllers without recommendation.

As the city solicitor reported the city had power to extend water mains outside the city, providing for the expense out of current revenue, the city engineer's suggestion to apply for legislation was struck out.

Something definite has at last been arrived at respecting the paving of Bloor-st. from Bathurst-st. to Shaw-st. Sectional likes and dislikes for certain kinds of pavement have kept back a needed remedy, but the committee took a firm grip of the question yesterday and recommended that Mr. Rust prescribe cedar blocks for the whole extent save from Shaw-st. to Dovercourt-st. for which bitulith is asked.

No opposition was offered to the proposition that a by-law be submitted to the people asking \$100,000 for the construction of Lansdowne-av. subway.

A fully signed petition for asphalt paving having been received from residents of Northcote-av. from Queen-st. to Afton-av., it was decided to alter the original recommendation for bitulith.

The assessment commissioner and city engineer were asked to jointly report upon a proposition to extend Catharine-st. to Spadina-av. The city engineer was also ordered to report upon the application of Samuel Benjamin & Co. to be allowed to erect an overhead bridge on Piper-st.

Funeral of Mrs. Hatch. Whitty, Nov. 17.—(Special)—The funeral took place this afternoon of Mrs. Elizabeth B. Hatch, widow of the late Samuel B. Hatch.

The deceased was in her 72nd year, and lived in this town for over half a century. Her husband predeceased her several years ago.

Mrs. Hatch's death was not unexpected, as she had been an invalid for the past two or three years.

Two sons, Frank of British Columbia and Fred of the Whitty Sashery Hardware Manufacturing Co., and three daughters, Mrs. T. G. Whitfield and Miss Bessie Hatch of Whitty, and Mrs. Joseph Irving of Whitty, survive their parents.

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HAD MAGISTRATE THE RIGHT TO IGNORE HABEAS CORPUS?

Counsel for A. R. Walton Argues at Osgoode Hall That Court Proceedings Are Illegal.

That Police Magistrate Denison and Detective Mackie should be "attached" for ignoring the habeas corpus proceedings in the case of A. R. Walton was the motion made by J. R. Mackenzie at Osgoode Hall yesterday. Walton by advocate affirmed that when in court he declared his counsel was not present the magistrate asked: "Are there not counsel present? Why should we not proceed with the case?" What concern have I with the habeas corpus proceedings?" that the magistrate wanted to know what difference it made if the prisoner had been wrongly brought across the border, there were charges against him in his court that he must answer. Accordingly he was remanded to jail Nov. 14.

Mr. Mackenzie argued that the prisoner in the custody of the high court should not be detained by the magistrate.

Chief Justice Meredith said that all he had to do was to determine whether the habeas corpus proceedings were validly brought. Walton was entitled to discharge. As to the allegation that Walton was not openly extrajudicially brought across the border, the justice said:

"If you steal a man, the courts have here. That is a matter for the government to deal with. All I have to do is to find out whether he is rightfully where he is. The best place for you to go," he added, "is to Washington to see the president."

In giving judgment that the prisoner be remanded in custody, Sir Wilfrid Lam pointed out that, if the prisoner was released he would be re-arrested immediately.

Mr. Mackenzie will take the matter to the court of appeal on Monday, as he says habeas corpus proceedings expressly provide against re-arrest on the same charge, under a penalty of \$500.

TO ABOLISH TOLL GATES.

Township Authorities Also Ask That Market Fees Be Abolished.

Brookville, Nov. 17.—(Special)—The committee appointed by the town council to consider the question of the abolition of the two toll gates on the road leading into Brookville, met in session yesterday.

It was finally decided to call a special meeting of the town council, and also of the township council, when each body would appoint a committee with full power to handle the question of the toll gates. The committee so appointed would be asked to meet the township council at its sessions here which open Tuesday.

The proposition is that Brookville abolish market fees in consideration of the gates being removed.

BOARD OF TRADE FOR SALE.

Order Made by Judge Snider Regarding Big Building.

Judge Snider of Hamilton has, at the instance of the court, ordered the holders and debenturees of the Toronto Board of Trade building to sell to satisfy a \$200,000 mortgage. The court has also ordered that the building be sold for the protection of the second and third debenture holders. The New York Life has the privilege of buying the property under their mortgage.

FLAGS FOR ENTERTAINERS.

Toronto School Teachers to Reward Pittsburgh Hosts.

The committee who planned the teachers' trip to Pittsburgh has arranged to present a fine silk Canadian flag to the Canadian Club in Pittsburgh. The committee has also secured some beautiful two yard silk flags for those who contributed most to their entertainments and thirty inch silk flags for each of the twenty-four members of the Pittsburgh committee.

The presentation will be made Nov. 24, in the board room at 8 p. m., at the residence of the president of the Canadian Society of Pittsburgh and some of the members, one representative of the education department of Pittsburgh, and Mr. Fraser, representing the Pennsylvania railroad, will be present.

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YANKS SEE A BULL FIGHT.

SICKEN AT BLOODY SIGHT.

Two Matadors Dragged About Ring by Frenzied Beast for Entertainment of Throng.

El Paso, Tex., Nov. 17.—At the bull fight at Ciudad Jarez, yesterday, given for the American Mining Convention, there was a panic when Felix Robert, the French matador, who claims to be the only matador of that nationality, was tossed in the air and carried from the arena, bruised and bleeding.

Later the same bull, a ferocious beast from the ranch of Gen. La Torre, governor of Chihuahua, made a run and plunged its long sharp horns thru Matador Francisco Alonzo Piquero, tossing him into the air first, then dragging him about the ring, blood streaming from the wounds in the man's body.

The spectators sickened at the sight and women fainted and screamed to be carried. The arena was packed with Americans, few of whom had ever seen a bull fight, and for a time the situation was serious. Many men rushed from the sickening sight in horror, while the women in many instances were carried out unconscious.

Order was finally restored, but most of the Americans left, deciding that the active and intense nature of the Mexican and Spanish national sport, although it was only the second bull fight for slaughter out of the four matadors for the matador's sword.

C.P.R. AT PARRY SOUND.

Railway Commission Looks Into Lumber Company's Complaint.

Parry Sound, Nov. 17.—Judge Kilham and Dr. Mills of the board of railway commissioners visited this town today for the purpose of examining into the dispute between the Parry Sound Lumber Company and the C. P. R., regarding the proposed crossing of the railway on a high elevation thru the yards of the lumber company.

At invitation of the commissioners a meeting of the citizens was held with a view to ascertain their opinion on the proposed C. P. R. location and any other railway matters affecting the public.

WAS DRIVING ON TRACK.

Melancthon Township Man Struck by C. P. R. Train.

Owen Sound, Nov. 17.—(Special)—W. C. Hooker, manufacturer, of Auguston, Melancthon township, was struck and badly hurt by the C.P.R. north-bound train from Toronto last night, about two miles south of Dundalk, while driving on the track half a mile from a crossing.

Hooker was driving towards the train and as the engineer did not see him until he was only a short distance off he could not stop the train in time to avoid a collision. The horse was killed instantly and dragged some distance in front of the engine. The whole outfit

was completely demolished, and Hooker himself thrown into the ditch. When picked up he was unconscious.

A similar accident occurred last spring only a short distance from the scene of this one.

Detroit, Nov. 17.—Parents and relatives of A. Taylor, an 8-year-old boy of Toronto, Ont., who spent the greater part of the summer in this city are claiming him as one of the huskiest boys of his age on record. Frank weighs just 98 pounds.
