TREMBLAY GOT BAIL

The Alleged Perjuror of Montreal Released on Sureties of \$500—Pleads Not Guilty. Montreal, Sept. 18.—(Special.)—Ex-Constable Aram Tremblay, who was arrested on Saturday on a warrant sworn out by Chief of Police Hughes, charging him with perjury, appeared before Magistrate Lafontaine in the Court of Pleas this morning, and answered "Not guilty" when the complaint was read to him. The preliminary investigation was set for Wednesday at 10 o'clock in the afternoon. Mr. R. E. Green, Q.C., made application for bail, and the magistrate agreed to accept it in the form of two sureties of \$400 each.

felt to be desirable and to be within our means. Toronto was growing, wealth and population were rapidly increasing, and there was every indication that the growth and increase would continue. New plans by the same architect and submitted to the Executive and Court House Committee, who on the 29th of February, 1887, presented a joint report to the Council, recommending the erection of a combined building already raised. The report was adopted, and bylaws for \$400,000 and \$500,000 respectively were submitted to a vote of the people on the 10th of April, 1887, and received their assent. \$1,050,000 had now been authorized for the work. Specifications and plans in detail were prepared and tenders invited for the following work: (1) Masonry; (2) Carpentering; (3) Painting and glazing; (4) Lathing and plastering; (5) Roofing; (6) Galvanizing iron work; (7) Wrought-iron work.

More Money Necessary. On opening the tenders, it was apparent that more money would be required, and the people were appealed to again. On the 28th of May, 1888, a bylaw for \$600,000 was submitted to the ratepayers, and carried by a majority of 1244, making a total of \$1,650,000 authorized. Contracts were then awarded, amounting to \$1,225,000.

Laying the Corner Stone. On the 21st of November, 1891, two years and four months from the laying of their contract, Messrs. Elliott & Neslon had the work sufficiently advanced to admit of the corner stone being laid. In the presence of a large number of people Mr. E. F. Clarke, Mayor, assisted by William G. Gibbs, chairman of the Court House Committee, and all the aldermen, duly laid the corner stone.

Additional Contracts. The expenditure on the works covered by their contract, has been \$322,291.63, making the total cost of the new building \$1,977,291.63. The principal contract for the work only had been awarded; there yet remained many large and important contracts to be made.

More Money Voted. In 1886 a bylaw was passed by the Council for \$200,000, and in 1887 by the people an additional sum of \$750,000. Since then the Legislature has authorized the city to raise \$2,000,000 more, making a total of \$4,977,291.63 for the new City Hall.

Nothing Exceptional. That this building has cost more than contemplated when the work was commenced is a repetition of a very general experience in erecting large buildings, where the whole of the contracts are not taken at the commencement.

An Inevitable Conclusion. The above sum shows that buildings which were originally estimated to cost \$500,000, and the cost of which was limited by statute to \$750,000, when the work commenced, have, before completion, at least cost over three times the original estimate, and over double the limit fixed by statute when erection was commenced.

Full Value for the Money. I believe we have received value for the money spent. Where others will do any part of the new City Hall, they will find that the work of every trade will bear the closest inspection. The money was spent on this building and not on a trunk sewer which is answered in this manner—once in the fall of 1886 and again in the early winter of 1887—costed a by-law for a trunk sewer. On both occasions large additions to the premises of the older factories are conclusive proof of this fact. Banking institutions, loan societies and real estate companies doing business in Toronto are not backed by enormous capital and need not divide. Loss to shareholders, to depositors or creditors through failure is of very rare occurrence. Nor has capital all the advantages; the claims of labor are recognized and respected by the management; strikes are generally settled by mutual concession, and are never accompanied by acts of violence, such as sometimes occur elsewhere.

Our educational system brings within the reach of all a high class education at little cost. As a church-going, Sabbath-observant community, Toronto is decidedly placed first among cities. Its parks and recreations are such as tend to the health of the body, and the mind, and the soul. The summer months seem almost like a long holiday, so well do the people know how to take advantage of the varied means of enjoyment at their disposal. No one who has seen the varied means of recreation and rational enjoyment.

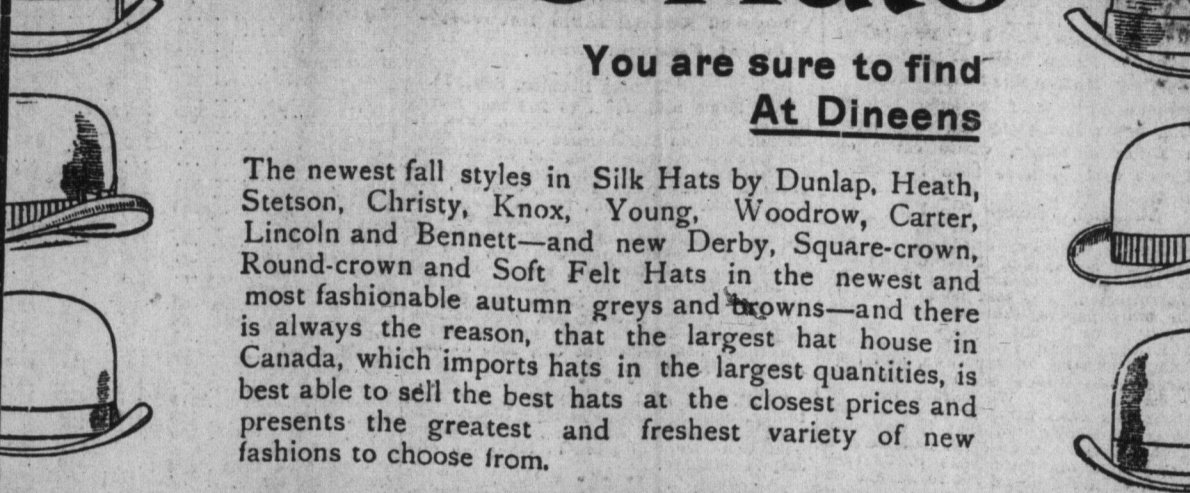

Death Game Very Suddenly Mrs. James Gillespie Found Dead in Bed by Her Daughter Yesterday Morning. A HIGHLY RESPECTED WOMAN. Miss Eliza Wilkes Uttered a Cry and Passed Away From Life Early in the Morning. Death came suddenly to two respected residents of the city yesterday morning. Mrs. Jane Powers, wife of James Gillespie, was found dead in bed at her home, 137 Sherbourne street, at 10 o'clock yesterday past two weeks, but was able to get up and about as usual the day before. On Sunday evening she retired and was feeling a little improved. When she did not come downstairs yesterday morning her daughter went to her room, and was shocked to find her mother lying cold in death. Dr. M. Wallace was called, and also Dr. Doollittle, but their services were of no avail. Deceased was 60 years of age, and had been married for 30 years. She was a regular attendant at St. Michael's Cathedral, and has many friends in the city. Her husband is a miller in the Gooderham & Worts' dismanement. Five children survive, two sons, Charles J. and John, are jewelers. The funeral to-morrow morning will take place from St. Michael's Cathedral, and thence to St. Michael's Cemetery.
